The city of Bend will raise \$300,000 to aid in the construction of a railroad in central Oregon.

A three mile flume has just been completed which will bring 30,000,000 feet of lumber into Wilsonville, where it will be shipped.

The Southern Pacific company will establish an oil base at Marshfield for the purpose of furnishing oils and other supplies for their train operations.

The Simons-Logan mine, near Grants Pass, made a cleanup of \$23,199.

The new town of Crane is to have a bank.

Coos county dairies are to be replenished with \$50,000 worth of fine cows.

The plans for the new armory of the state university have been completed and bids are being taken for its construction.

The S. P. & S. R. R. Co. has had plans and specifications prepared for the proposed freight house to be built at East Belmont and East Third streets in Portland.

The school directors at Enterprise have decided to build a new high school building. The building specifications are nearly finished and a contract for the erection of the building will soon be made.

Marshfield, Ore.—The Coos County court has appropriated \$20,000 towards the construction of an armory here. The last legislature appropriated \$20,000 and the city officials are expected to donate a site and funds, making another \$20,000.

North Bend, Ore.—P. M. Tully, of this city, has been awarded the Standard Oil Company construction, which involves the erection of a waterfront oil depot, office building and docks, half way between this city and Marshfield.

ORDINANCE NO. 202

An Ordinance Prohibiting utterances and actions of disrespect toward the American National Flag and the Government of the United States of America, and providing a penalty therefor.

The City of St. Helens does ordain as follows: Section 1. Any person who shall mutilate, trample upon, deface, tear at or defile the national flag of the United States of America, or tear down, destroy or remove any such flag belonging to another, or who shall jeer at or defy the National Government of the United States, or publicly express joy or satisfaction at any defeat to said government or any unit or forces thereof, or publicly express any hope for the defeat thereof, or of any unit or force thereof, or publicly express a hope for the destruction of the property of said government or the citizens thereof, by any enemy of said government shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 2. Any person violating the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than Ten Dollars or more than Ninety-nine Dollars and costs of prosecution, and in default of the payment thereof shall be imprisoned in the City Jail or compelled to work out said fine and costs, at the rate of one day for each Two Dollars of such fine and costs so due and unpaid.

Section 3. Whereas, the United States of America is at war with a foreign enemy and many foreigners are inclined to show disrespect for the flag and American institutions, whereby the health, peace and safety of the City of St. Helens is jeopardized, therefore an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Ordinance shall become operative immediately upon its approval by the Mayor of said City.

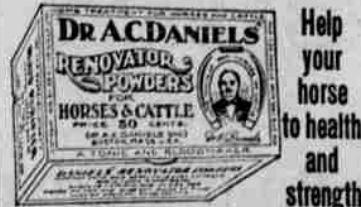

GOVERNMENT CROP AND STOCK REPORT

Washington, April 7.—A summary of the April crop and livestock report for the state of Oregon, as compiled by the bureau of crop estimates is as follows:

Wheat—Condition April 1 this year, 84 per cent of normal; ten-year average condition figures for April 1, 96 per cent.

Rye—Condition April 1 this year, 94 per cent; ten-year average April 1 condition, 98 per cent.

Hogs—Losses from disease past year, 2.0 per cent; ten-year average, 1.9 per cent.

Cattle—Losses from disease past year, 1.4 per cent; ten-year average, 1.4 per cent. Losses from exposure past year, 2.4 per cent; ten-year average, 1.7 per cent.

Sheep—Losses from disease past

year, 2.2 per cent; ten-year average, 1.9 per cent. Losses from exposure past year, 4.0 per cent; ten-year average, 2.7 per cent.

Horses and Mules—Losses from disease past year, 1.6 per cent; ten-year average, 1.7 per cent.

Prices—The first price given is the average on April 1 this year and the second the average on April 1 last year: Wheat, \$1.54 and \$1.51 per bushel; corn, \$1.02 and \$1.00; oats, 56 and 40c; potatoes, \$1.10 and 82c; hay, \$14.50 and \$14.00; eggs, 27 and 20c per dozen.
