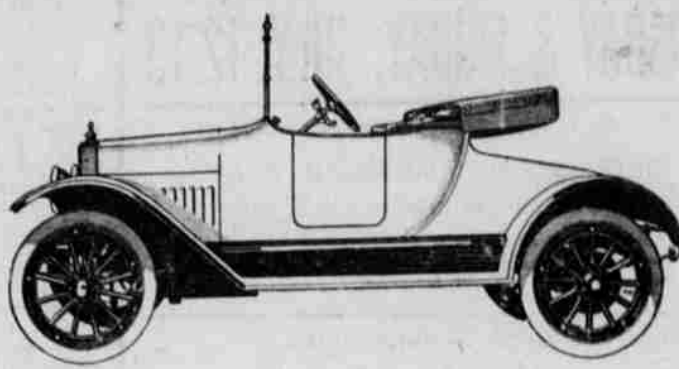

MEN REGISTERED FOR DRAFT GIVEN NUMBERS

Exemption Boards Take First Step in Selection of Army.
Exemption boards which will administer the selection of the draft have begun giving serial numbers to the men who were registered on June 5.
Instructions from Washington are to post the numbers publicly as soon as given. This was being done in some parts of the country early this week and led to false reports that drafted numbers had been announced.
No drafting whatever has been done as yet and probably will not be done for several days.

MORE THAN GOOD

Columbia county did more than its quota for the Red Cross. It went \$4,000 over.
