SUMMER CARE OF BOAR

Furnish Him Pasture, Shade, Shelter, Good Water and Little or No Grain.

After the close of the spring breeding season, the boar should be kept over the summer as cheaply as possible. Maintain him in good, hard, thrifty, breeding condition by giving him an opportunity to exercise and by feeding him largely on pasture and forage crops.

A mature boar, if heavily grain fed, has a great tendency to fatten. The boar should be well fed, but not fat, as too high condition makes him inactive, a slow breeder, and a rather uncertain sire.

The boar needs little attention during the summer. Provide shelter, shade and a fresh, clean water supply, and he will almost care for himself. Pasture is the best as well as the cheapest feed. It furnishes an abundance of nutrients, is palatable and keeps the boar's system in good physical condition.

Permanent pastures are among the best, and certainly require the least attention. The clovers, blue grass, Bermuda, alfalfa, all make excellent pastures and furnish grazing during a long season. If these are not available, small plots of several temporary pasture crops may be used; for example, rape, peas and oats, peanuts, velvet beans, sorghum, cowpeas and soy beans. By using any of these forage crops the boar can be maintained over the summer with a very small amount of grain, while if they were not used several pounds of grain per day would be required. On pasture, feed only enough grain to keep the boar in breeding condition. Very often, on good pasture, none will be required. Guard against feeding too much grain and getting the boar too fat.

The boar should be confined to a paddock and not run with the rest of the herd. If he is with another boar they are apt to fight, and if he is placed with the breeding herd the sows will farrow at indefinite dates. It would be impossible under these conditions to keep records of the time of service, and no provision could be made to care for the sow previous to farrowing.

In summer keep the boar thrifty but not too fat; use pasture to attain this end and to reduce the cost of feeding to a minimum.

Heed, then, the spirit of safety. Be careful of yourself; thoughtful and considerate of your fellow men; kind and provident in your home. In these things lie the greatest achievements of right purpose and true success.—The Gas Industry.

AMERICAN TRADE AT RECORD STAGE

American imports in May of \$281,000,000 reached the highest total of any month in the history of American commerce. Exports of \$551,000,000 showed a gain of \$21,000,000 over April.

Both imports and exports for the twelve months ending with May set new yearly records, imports being valued at \$2,600,000,000 and exports at \$6,183,000,000.

Seventy-one per cent of the merchandise entering in May came free of duty. For the 12-month period the percentage was 69.3. Gold exports in May, valued at \$53,000,000, were \$6,000,000 greater than imports. Net gold imports for the 12 months were valued at \$17,000,000.

PETITION TO FORM MAGRUDER DRAINAGE DISTRICT.

IN THE COUNTY COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON FOR THE COUNTY OF COLUMBIA. In the Matter of the Organization of Magruder Drainage District in Columbia County in the State of Oregon.

To the Honorable R. F. Hatton, County Judge, and Judson Weed and A. E. Harvey, County Commissioners, setting as the County Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Columbia:

We, the undersigned, do hereby petition your Honorable Body and, in this behalf, do respectfully represent and show:

That the following named parties are shown by the records of Columbia County, Oregon, to be either the owners or contract holders of land within the district embraced by the boundary lines hereinafter more particularly set out, and all are in possession of the particular land hereinafter set out opposite the name of each, where a particular description is given, to-wit:

W. B. Colvin, Joseph Bagley, Rose Levings, Columbia Agricultural Company, a Corporation, W. J. Cooley, George W. Payne, George Wright and James W. Wright, D. D. Carrier, John Klegger, and Xavier White.

That the said lands so owned, as hereinafter set out, by the parties named above, contain approximately five hundred ninety-seven (597.54) acres; that all of the lands hereinafter described and referred to above constitute a single, contiguous body of swamp, wet, and overflowed lands, and are all situated in the County of Columbia, State of Oregon; and it is proposed by said owners and your petitioners to form a Drainage District under the provisions of and pursuant to the laws of the State of Oregon relating to Drainage Districts to reclaim said lands and acreage and to protect same by one system of drainage from the effects of water for sanitary and agricultural purposes, and to render the same conducive to the public health, convenience, and welfare, and of general public utility and benefit, and to prevent overflow from flood waters and to regulate the rise of the level of the sub-surface waters thereof; that a map or plat of said lands has been made and same has been duly executed, acknowledged, and filed with the County Clerk of Columbia County, Oregon, according to the laws of the State of Oregon, and the same is now named and called and known as "Magruder Drainage District."

That the name proposed for such Drainage District is "Magruder Drainage District."

That the boundary lines of the District is as follows: "Beginning at the Southwest corner of Tract Number 29 of the Magruder Drainage District in Columbia County, Oregon (map and plat of which said district as the same now exists is on file and of record with the County Clerk of that County, and reference is hereby now made to the same for the purpose of establishing a beginning point and is hereby made a part hereof), and running thence West 1076.3 feet along the section line between Sections 2 and 11 in Township 7 North, Range 5 West of the Willamette Meridian; thence Northerly 307.7 feet along the line of Colvin Logging Ditch; thence West 1079.9 feet to a point as shown on said map and plat above referred to; thence Southerly to the North line of the county road at a point 50 feet East of the line between the East and West half of Section 11, Township 7 North, Range 5 West, W. M.; thence West 50 feet to the line between the East and West half of Section 11, T. 7 N., R. 5 W., W. M.; thence Northerly along the line between the East and West half of Sections 11 and 2 in Township 7 North, Range 5 West, W. M.; to the South line of Westport Slough; thence in an Easterly direction and following along the South bank of said Westport Slough to the point of intersection of said South bank of said Slough with the West bank of Kinnunen Cut, as shown by said map and plat referred to above; thence in a general Southerly direction and along the line shown on said map and plat, referred to above, to the North line of the right of way of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railroad Company; thence West 50 feet to the North line of said right of way to a point 500.2 feet East of the Southwest corner of Tract No. 9 of said Magruder Drainage District, as referred to above; thence South to a point 500.2 feet East of the Northwest corner of Tract No. 21 of said Magruder Drainage District referred to above; thence in a general southerly direction, and following the line between the level land and the hill land to a point on the line dividing Tracts Number 21 and Number 22 of said Magruder Drainage District, above referred to, 1197.2 feet Southerly from the Northwest corner of Tract Number 21 of said Magruder Drainage District, referred to above; thence West 1076.3 feet and following the

line between the level land and the hill land to the Southwest corner of Tract Number 23 of said Magruder Drainage District, referred to above; thence West 1076.3 feet along the line of said Magruder Drainage District, referred to above, to the point of intersection of the Dixon & Merrill logging ditches; thence Southerly along the Westerly boundary line of the C. N. Cole land, to the Northerly line of the county road; thence West 30 feet; along the said Northerly line of the county road; thence Northerly and parallel to the Westerly boundary line of the C. N. Cole land to a point where the low or level land meets the hill land; thence in a Westerly direction and following the line where the level land and the hill land meet, to the place of beginning; excepting therefrom, however, the right of way of the S. P. & S. Railroad Company which is not described by these courses and distances but which is embraced by and included within the above boundary lines; containing approximately 597.54 acres; that all of the land above described and included within the boundary set out and intended to be included in said Drainage District constitute a contiguous body of swamp, wet, and overflowed lands.

That the total acreage included in said district is 597.54, and is all included within one county, to-wit: Columbia County in the State of Oregon.

That the names of the owners of lands in said District, as shown by the records of said Columbia County, Oregon, and the names of the holders of contracts to purchase lands within said district, and a description of each separately owned tract and a description of the tract on which there is a contract holder, and the acreage owned, as shown by the record or by said contract, by each of said parties is hereinafter set opposite the name of said owner of contract holder, and is as follows:

Table with columns: Name, Description, Acreage. Includes entries for W. B. Colvin (56.14), Joseph Bagley (17.19), Rose Levings (16.26), Columbia Agricultural Co. (402.95), and various contract holders.

That each of said tracts mentioned above was and is included within and is a part of the lands which were heretofore platted and filed with the County Clerk of Columbia County, Oregon, as the Magruder Drainage District.

That said proposed reclamation and protection is for sanitary and agricultural purposes, and that such proposed reclamation and protection will be conducive to the public health and welfare and of public utility and benefit.

That all of the lands included in said proposed district are properly included therein and will be beneficially effected by the operations of the proposed district.

That the benefits of such proposed reclamation and protection will exceed the damage to be done and that the best interests of the lands included and of the owners of such lands, and of the public at large, will be promoted by the formation and proposed operations of such proposed drainage district.

That the formation of a drainage district, under the provisions of the present law of Oregon governing such, to-wit: Being Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon of the Session of the Legislature of 1915, entitled "An Act to provide for the organization of Drainage Districts for the Construction, Operation, and maintenance of Drainage Systems and for the payment of such Systems and Expenses incidental thereto," which was filed in the Office of the Secretary of State February 26th, 1915, and of the previous laws of said state, is a proper and advantageous method of accomplishing the reclamation and protection of the lands included therein.

That the following is a brief, general, informal statement of the proposed plan of reclamation and protection to be adopted in said district with such general facts as will enable the Court to determine that there is a reasonable probability that the objects sought by the formation of the district may be accomplished, to-wit:

To construct a levee around said low lands connecting with the high or uplands to an elevation of 1876 high water of the Columbia river at said lands and by installing a system of drains and automatic tide gates, and also a permanent pumping plant with which to expel the surplus water from said district during periods of high water to outside the district when the automatic tide gates will not operate, the object being to drain all the lands of such district which are now subject to overflow and to prevent the water from the Columbia river from flowing in, upon, or sweep in or upon the same, and thus, to render the lands suitable for cultivation and conducive to public health and convenience, and of public utility and benefit.

XII. In consideration of the entertainment by the above entitled Court of this Petition and, in consideration of granting this Petition and authorizing the formation and organization of said Drainage District, we, the undersigned, and each of us, do hereby expressly promise and agree to pay any and all expenses incurred and any assessments or taxes that may be levied against our respective lands for the purpose of paying the expenses of said organization or attempt to organize said district.

XIII. That the petitioners herein and the ones whose names are shown herein to be the owners of record of lands within said district represent more than fifty per cent of all the acreage in said proposed Drainage District.

XIV. That, in the descriptions of the property above mentioned, where the dividing line between the overflow land and the high land is referred to; what is meant is the line dividing the ordinary overflow land from the high or upland adjoining the same.

WHEREFORE, your petitioners pray that the lands above described, or such of them as may be found by the Court to be properly included in the proposed Drainage District, either permanently or until further investigation and surveys may permit the elimination, shall be declared organized and formed into a Drainage District under the laws of the State of Oregon to be known as Magruder Drainage District; and your petitioners will ever pray.
