PORTLAND MARKETS

Cattle—The cattle yards have been well filled during the week and though the market was rather dull at the close of last week, Monday's movement was brisk and a large volume was transacted, which totaled around 1200 head. Some choice prime steers brought \$10.50, but the general market conditions indicated a decline over the previous week of 50 to 75 cents. Yesterday's market conditions would warrant a quotation of \$9 to \$9.75 for best beef steers and \$8.50 to \$9 for good steers. Butcher stuff and cows, however, declined nearly \$1 from last week's

market. The best cows are selling as high as \$7.50 but the bulk are going at \$7 and lower. The bull market is steady with last week's close, and 50c lower than last week's opening. Veal calves are quoted at \$9 to \$9.50, and some splendid offerings went through the yards. Stockers and feeders were steady with last week's prices and some very excellent feeders were handled at the yards from \$5 to \$7.50.

Hogs—The hog alley was rather heavier Monday than a week ago, about 1200 head being received. The rise in price was continued at the opening, and many loads went for \$16. A fair quotation for the bulk would be \$15.85 to \$16.05, and the demand good.

Sheep—The sheep market remains steady with only 500 head on the market. Spring lambs are getting from \$12.25 to \$12.75. Mt. Adams yearlings \$10.25, and ewes from \$4 to \$8.

GOVERNMENT CROP REPORT

A summary of the July crop report for the state of Oregon, compiled by the bureau of crop estimates, U. S. department of Agriculture, is as follows:

Winter Wheat—July 1 forecast, 9,300,000 bu.; production last year (December estimate), 13,340,000 bu.

Spring Wheat—Forecast July 1, 6,340,000 bu.; production last year (December estimate), 6,210,000 bu.

Oats—July 1 forecast, 15,000,000 bu.; production last year, 17,280,000 bushels.

Barley—July 1 forecast, 6,350,000 bu.; production last year, 5,390,000 bushels.

Potatoes—July 1 forecast, 9,360,000 bushels; production last year, 8,250,000 bu.

Potatoes—United States—July 1 forecast, 452,000,000 bu.; production last year (December estimate), 285,437,000 bu.

All Hay—July 1 forecast, 2,250,000 tons; production last year (December estimate), 2,175,000 tons.

Apples (Agricultural Crop)—July 1 forecast, 1,390,000 bbls of 3 bu.; production last year, 1,285,000 bbls.
