ELECTRIFYING THE STEAM RAILROADS

The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad has electrified 450 miles of its line from Harlowtown, Mont., to Avery, Idaho, and has under construction electric installation from Avery to Seattle, 500 miles more.

Against a cost of \$1,750,000 for coal from its own mines to operate the 450 miles, by electricity it costs \$650,000 a year, and on top of this one-third of the equipment of the road was used to haul coal.

The Butte, Anaconda & Pacific railroad pays \$96,000 a year for electrical power to operate 80 miles of railroad as against \$270,000 a year for coal for the same line, doing a bigger business.

It takes 10,000 horsepower to operate 100 miles of single-track railroad, and there are 48,700 miles of railroad in Washington, Oregon, California, Utah, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, North and South Dakota, Arizona, Colorado and Nevada.

SIGNS INDICATE GOOD ENROLLMENT

"Everything indicates a good enrollment at the University of Oregon when college opens October 1," said Registrar A. R. Tiffany. Mr. Tiffany bases his estimate on responses to letters recently sent out to those who were students at the university last year, asking them to indicate whether they expected to return this fall. The responses indicate that for every student who will not enter or is undecided, six expect to be on hand when college opens. Though more than 150 men who were students in the university last year are now enlisted in some branch of military service, the returns indicate that as many men as women expect to go on with their education at the university next term. With the opening of college nearly a month later than last year, nearly as many applications are on file as at this time last year from students who will enter as freshmen.

ORDINANCE NO. 207

An Ordinance to prohibit the use of City water during a fire; and providing a penalty therefor.

The City of St. Helens does ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to use any City water, other than for drinking purposes, during a fire or the progress of any fire within the City of St. Helens; and any person so doing, upon conviction thereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum of not less than Twenty Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars, or be imprisoned in the City jail for not less than ten days nor more than fifty days, or by both such fines and imprisonment.

INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

A new hotel is projected for Bandon. Work may soon begin.

A new building for an ice plant is being constructed at Stayton.

The Strahorn railroad is now laying rails out of Klamath Falls and a first locomotive has arrived, just a year after the first proposal of Mr. Strahorn to build the road, which

will open up a vast and productive territory in southeastern Oregon.

The 1,100-acre Star ranch near Bandon has been sold to a Hood River man for \$125,000.

An irrigation power plant with large capacity is being constructed at Oden Falls, near Redmond.

The Seattle Lumber Company will mine and operate quarries near Salem. The company is capitalized at \$100,000.

At Salem, a modern automobile building will be built by Max O. Buren and will be occupied by the Dodge Automobile Co.

Nitrate properties have been opened in the Vale district in eastern Oregon, and a Tacoma company will build a \$40,000 plant.

The Alaska salmon pack was not so large this year as in 1916, when it was 500,000 cases. This year it totalled 450,000 cases.

There were 9,500 head of sheep recently shipped from Elkin, Wallowa, Lostine and other Wallowa county points to Chicago.

The county court of Coos county has placed an order for a Holt caterpillar costing \$5,700, which will be placed at work on the county road.

The caterpillar is capable of hauling several trailers loaded with gravel and is expected to make road building more economical.

The Farmers' Mutual Telephone Company of Toledo has asked the public service commission for permission to extend its telephone line to a connection in Toledo. Should the commission grant the request it will be of much benefit to the many farmers along the rural route.
