INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

The Springfield planing mill has made its initial shipment of one carload of tent pins to apply on the large government order on which they are working.

The paper mill at Lebanon is running three shifts in order to fill orders on hand.

The Rowley copper mines, about five miles south of Drew, are to be developed.

The government has let a contract for the extension of the jetty at Yaquina bay to a Portland firm. The extension is to be about 1,000 feet and will cost approximately \$400,000.

Lane county is planning a \$30,000 addition to the courthouse in Eugene.

The Albina Engine and Machine Works has secured a government contract for four steel vessels to cost \$4,000,000.

Twenty miles of the Strahorn railroad, running out of Klamath Falls, has been completed. As soon as weather conditions permit, more construction work will be done.

Cheese manufactured in and shipped from Tillamook county during the year 1917 brought the producers the tidy sum of \$1,150,000.

The Silver Falls Timber Company at Silverton has begun construction of additional logging railroads to tap their large timber holdings.

RECIPES

Rice Bread

A delicious rice bread can be made as follows: Two cupsfuls boiled rice, two eggs, one and one-half cupsfuls flour, butter the size of a walnut and milk sufficient to thin the mixture. The rice may be slightly warm. Beat the eggs separately, then mix with the milk and flour, add the rice and seasoning, put into baking pans and bake like bread in a moderate oven. When done, split the loaves, sprinkle with sugar and butter and serve.

Oatmeal Muffins

One and one-half cups milk, two eggs, two tablespoons sugar, two tablespoons fat, one teaspoon salt, two cups rolled oats, one cup flour, four teaspoons baking powder. Pour milk over oats and let soak one-half hour. Add eggs and melted fat. Add the dry ingredients, which have been sifted together. Bake 25 to 30 minutes. This makes 10 to 12 muffins.

Cabbage and Celery Salad

Shred a small head of cabbage, let it stand in water for an hour or two. Just before it is to be served drain and dry it. Mix with it very finely cut white celery, enough to give it a celery flavor, toss it thoroughly in the following dressing:

Rub a bowl with the cut side of a piece of garlic, put in a saltspoonful of salt, a dash of pepper, a drop of tabasco sauce and six tablespoonfuls of olive oil. When the ingredients are blended add a tablespoonful of tarragon vinegar and beat in a little at a time.

Irish Potato Cake

This is a delicious hot bread when properly made. Place in a mixing bowl one cupful of creamy cold mashed potatoes. Add one cupful and a half of rye flour, half a teaspoonful of salt and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Rub in with the finger tips a scant tablespoonful of clarified beef dripping and wet with cold sweet milk to a dough that can be handled. Handle as little as possible; roll out lightly on the bread board; shape into a circle and lay in a greased pan.

Cut in wedge shaped pieces, brush over with a little melted margarine and bake in a quick oven until crisp and brown. This cake is to be split open and served with butter.

**GOVERNMENT PRICES
ON MILL FEED**

"News of the utmost importance to the farmers and stockraisers, and to the whole people of the northwest," said Federal Food Administrator W. B. Ayer, "was the recent announcement that the manufacture of mill feeds had come under government control through the federal licensing system, and that the price of bran had been fixed at \$30 a ton, with shorts at \$32 and middlings at \$39. These prices are substantially lower than have prevailed, and the supply will be materially increased by the milling of all wheat possible here in the northwest, instead of shipping the whole wheat away to be milled elsewhere. This makes the outlook much brighter for those who have been struggling to keep their herds and flocks together in the face of great difficulties and uncertainty.

"The new prices are already effective, and will even be made on unfilled contracts. At the recent conference of leading millers of the northwest with the United States milling commissioner, the millers very generously volunteered to adopt the new prices for all unfilled contracts, although some of these contracts were for delivery at prices upward of 20 per cent more than the new figure. This splendid action of the millers made the new basis operative at once for all shipments.

"Now that the uncertainty of feed prices has been eliminated and the largest possible supply assured, the farmers and stockraisers can feel secure in making their plans, and I earnestly urge that these plans be made for the largest possible production of food animals. The market for beef, pork, mutton and poultry, because of the world shortage, will inevitably be strong and steady for a long time to come, and the raising of food animals under the new conditions cannot fail to prove a sound and profitable business investment as well as an important patriotic service."
