

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Small pieces of old silk blouses should be cut into squares and hemmed. They make ideal dusters for china and delicate articles of bric-a-brac.

If too much salt has been added to soup, slice a raw potato and boil it in the soup for a few minutes. The potato will absorb much of the salt.

Rub a greasy range with waste paper while it is still hot. The paper will take off all the grease, and when cold the range will be easy to clean.

A useful cement for mending delicate china may be made by mixing rice flour with cold water and simmering it gently over a fire until it becomes thick.

Instead of using soda for washing clothes, add one teaspoonful of turpentine. This not only saves soda but also coal, as the clothes take less time to boil.

For cleaning the rubber rollers of the clothes wringer you will find kerosene oil excellent. After rubbing thoroughly with this rinse the rollers in warm water.

To make a good broom holder nail two rods to the wall, about two inches apart. Hang the broom upside down between the rods.

If a lump of sugar is put into the teapot when making tea one spoonful of tea can be dispensed with.

Oatmeal will remove lamp-smoke stains from a wall.

Do not wrap up any article that is to be put away in white paper, as the chloride of lime in it will destroy the color of the material. Instead use brown or blue paper.

An easy way to clean globes when one is in a hurry is to hold them over the steam from a kettle, when they may be polished at once. This does them quickly and well.

Pour boiling water over raisins; let stand for a few minutes, drain the water off, and you will find that the stones can be quickly and easily squeezed out from the stem end.

Eucalyptus oil will remove grease stains from any kind of material without injuring it. Apply a little oil with a clean piece of flannel, and rub the material gently until the stains disappear.

To remove grease stains from a tiled hearth mix a strong solution of washing soda with some Fuller's earth. Apply the paste to the hearth and leave for about an hour. Afterward wash off with hot, soapy water.

Persons who send mail to members of the Expeditionary Force are particularly requested, in a statement issued by the postoffice department, to use ink only in writing the addresses. Every piece of mail matter should also bear the name and address of the sender.

Heavy paper, canvas, or cloth should be used for wrapping packages. When canvas or cloth is used the address should be written on a shipping tag, with the name and address of the sender on the reverse side.

Given names should be written in full, instead of initials. The title of the addressee and the full name of the unit or organization to which he is assigned should be added, it being sufficient in the way of further address to use the words "American Expeditionary Forces."
