FARM LOAN BOARD APPROVES BIG LOANS

A review of the first year of operation of the federal farm loan system shows that 2,808 national farm loan associations were incorporated, representing about four associations to each five counties of the United Kearney. States. They average 20 members, or a total membership of about 56,-000 farmers.

The 12 fand banks have received applications for over 120,000 loans. amounting to about \$300,000,000. About 80,000 loans, amounting to over \$160,000,000, have been approved, and on 30,000 of these loans the farmers.
