Albany—Work on new cannery plant here completed.

The Dalles—Contract let for 18 blocks of street pavement here.

Corvallis—Brown ranch and outfit located two miles east of here, sold for \$50,000.

Oregon City—Work of paving 8 miles Pacific highway in southern part of Clackamas county to commence.

Employees of G. M. Standifer Construction corporation plan \$15,000 recreation hall.

Southern—New sawmill established six miles east of here.

Roseburg—To have large fruit and vegetable cannery. Machinery to be installed at beginning to cost \$10,000.

Notakers have gone on record for lots of \$10,000 each by Grant Smith-Porter Ship Co., St. Johns, Oregon, that it could build hulls faster than any other yard, and by G. M. Standifer Construction Co., Vancouver, Washington, that it could complete wooden ships ahead of all competitors, according to J. W. Hall, assistant supervisor of the wooden ship construction division in the division of Oregon. Hall has wagered a dinner that Oregon builders can float a wooden hull in less than 40 days. The Grant Smith-Porter Company has floated a wooden hull in 50 days.

Alber—Alfalfa being grown successfully on Camas Prairie.

Prairie—Chrome business assures prosperous year for Grant county.

North Bend—Odd Fellows investigating chances of constructing modern concrete building for lodge and commercial purposes.

Gold Beach—Fishing operations in full swing now.

Portland—County commissioners authorize more than three miles of hard surfacing of Foster Road, providing Lentz with splendid thoroughfare to Portland.

Vale—Warm springs project to be realized. Will mean from 15 to 30 thousand acres of new land in Malheur valley.

Ontario—Ground broken for new water system. May be done in three months.

Dallas—Partial survey shows the growth of prune industry in Polk county. Present total 3,320 acres in Italian prunes.

Pendleton—Umatilla is first county to make contract with state for road maintenance. Terms of contract provides for care of ten mile section of the "Wild Horse road," paved by state last year.

Bandon—Negotiations practically closed to secure factory to make starch products from potatoes.

Reedsport—Giant sawmill for Reedsport to be constructed. Shipyard is likely.

Grants Pass—The machinery of the Ashland mine has been purchased by parties representing the "Mother Lode" interests in California, and is being shipped away.

Dallas—Dallas Box Factory doing rushing business.

Eugene—Early construction of railroad by federal government from Yaquina Bay, through Waldport county and its possible extension into Lane county for purpose of reaching valuable spruce tracts, is indicated by presence of surveyors who are working on the west coast of Lane county near Heceta Head lighthouse, to here.

Eugene—Crew of men has started work on old military highway above Oakridge in connection with plan of forest service to open this road for motor travel from Willamette valley to Klamath Falls, cutting off about 100 miles.

MONEY SHOULD BE SENT TO SOLDIERS

The original order that the approval of a regimental or higher commander was necessary before packages might be sent to members of the expeditionary forces has been modified so officers with the rank of major and higher may approve shipments. The approval of a company commander is not sufficient.

The question of the shipment of parcels to France first came to the attention of the war department when the commanding general of the expeditionary forces cabled that congestion of such articles had reached such a point that French railroads were unable to handle the load. A board appointed by the secretary of war and the postmaster general examined 5,000 sacks of parcel-post mail and found that the articles being sent not only, in the main, were absolutely unnecessary, but undesirable. The investigation showed that the amount of such mail had reached a total of 500,000 pounds a week and was steadily increasing.

Relatives and friends, according to a recent statement by the war department, will find they often can do a greater service to soldiers by sending them money for the purchase of articles in France than by forwarding the articles. Tobacco is now being supplied as part of the army rations and merchandise of nearly all kinds may now be purchased in France through the high general store established by the quartermasters corps, at lower prices than charged by retailers here.

IMMENSE STORES NEEDED FOR MEN

An account of how soldiers are fed at sea is given in the daily newspaper published on a transport:

"Outside of providing 210,000 meals at sea, the mess officer of the ship has very little to do. Very little.

"He is only called upon to provide, by the regulations, 180 different varieties of food. That's all. Ever try to order 180 different things to eat? Yet this is the authentic list.

"The food needed to feed several thousand men at sea ranges beyond the glutton's dreams. You get the answer in the ship down below the water line, where 7,290 loaves of bread have been baked in one day, and where you stumble over every variety, from 60,000 pounds of beef to 132,000 eggs, or a compartment of brick ice cream in a 10-degree-above-zero vault.

"And if this doesn't suit, you can bump along into 49,324 pounds of potatoes, 7,100 pounds of ham and bacon, 7,800 pounds of butter, 9,200 pounds of sugar and 61,500 pounds of flour.

"If you can't get a meal out of this you can still fall back on 4,600 pounds of sausage, 3,400 pounds of sauerkraut, 26,000 pounds of apples, 19,800 pounds of oranges and 4,200 pounds of onions. And this leaves out 1,600 pounds of jam and 9,400 pounds of lima and navy beans."

DENTAL CORPS TAKES CARE OF 5,000,000 MEN

The dental requirements of an army of more than 5,000,000 men can now be met by the present force of the dental corps of the United States army. Examinations have been closed and no further additions will be made to the corps for some time. The number of dental officers has expended since war was declared from 58 to 5,810. Commissions were offered to 5,467 dentists in all parts of the country and all but 271 were accepted.

The average number of tooth fillings in the army ranges from 225,000 to 250,000 a month. Special dental infirmaries have been established in the camps and cantonments to which newly inducted soldiers are sent for examination shortly after arrival in the camps.

A school for dental instruction has been established, where 85 officers are assigned each month to take the 2-months' course.
