ORDINANCE NO. 229

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the issurnce and sale of City of St. Helens Municipal Wharf Bonds in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5000) for the purpose of raising funds for the building and construction of a municipal wharf in the Columbia River at the easterly termination of St. Helens Street in said City, providing for and approving the form of said bonds and the coupons attached thereto, ratifying, approving and confirming the sale of said bonds and providing for the execution and delivery thereof, and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, Chapter VIII of the provides among other things that for the purpose of raising funds for the building and construction of a municipal wharf in the Columbia River at the easterly termi-nation of St. Helens Street in said City the Common Council is au-thorized and empowered to issue and dispose of bonds of said City in an amount not to exceed five dollara (\$5000) value; and

WHEREAS, no bonds have been isfor said purpose and it has now become necessary to horrow money and issue bonds in said sum therefor; now, therefore

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF ST. HELENS DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the City of St. Helens do issue bonds in the name of and under the corporate seal of said City in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5000) in denominations of two hundred dollars (\$200) each, Jackson bill (put on the ballet by aumbered consecutively from 1 to 25 c.
