SETTLEMENT PLAN MAY BE MADE NATIONAL

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis—Oregon's land settlement plan for homes for returning soldiers and other citizens of the United States will be offered to the federal government as a national land-settlement policy. Already Whitney L. Bole, chairman of the Oregon land settlement commission and H. D. Seudder, professor of farm management at the college, have gone to Washington to lay the Oregon plan before the national authorities with a view to its incorporation into the national law.

The distinctive feature of the Oregon plan is that it takes the settler and by financing and directing his farm operations assures his success. Heretofore the state has contented itself merely with putting him on the land, and then leaving him to sink or swim as chance might decide. And two out of every three promptly sank. Thus the state lost not only its prospective home-builder, but likewise its reputation as a home for new settlers.

Farm programs adapted to every district in Oregon where further settlement is advisable have already been worked out by Professor Seudder. Each program will be exemplified on a model farm in the district, on which an average settler will be placed to demonstrate the farm methods under an officer of the land settlement commission. The land, livestock, buildings and equipment will be supplied to the farmer on credit, under conditions most favorable to success.

The first unit farm has been bought by private capital to demonstrate the success of the plan. It is located in Polk county, and will be devoted to field crops, livestock and dairy farming. It consists of 60 acres of 100 an acre land. It is bound to do just what is claimed for it, asserts Professor Seudder.

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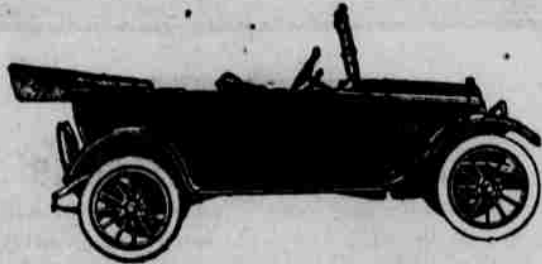
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
