Two Excellent Recipes in which

DOUGHNUTS

1 cup sugar, 2 1/2 tablespoons COLUMBIA BRAND OLEOMARGARINE, 3 eggs, 1 cup milk, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, flour to roll.

Cream the butter and add one-half sugar. Beat egg until light, and remaining sugar, and combine mixtures. Add 3/4 cups flour, mixed and sifted with baking powder, salt and spices. Then enough more flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Toss one-third of mixture on flour board, knead slightly, pat, and roll out to 1/4-inch thickness. Shape with a doughnut cutter, fry in deep fat, take up with a fork, and drain on brown paper. Repeat this process until mixture is used.



BISCUITS

3 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons COLUMBIA BRAND OLEOMARGARINE, and 1/2 cup milk.

Mix dry ingredients. Work in oleomargarine with tips of fingers; add gradually the liquids, mixing with knife to a soft dough. Toss on a floured board, pat and roll lightly to 1/4-inch in thickness. Shape with biscuit cutter. Place on buttered pan and bake in hot oven. It is impossible to determine the exact amount of liquid owing to the difference in flour.
