1919 WAR SAVING STAMPS

Purchasers of 1919 War Savings Stamps should not place them on 1918 folders—technically known as War Savings Certificates—is the warning of Samuel Hubbard, director of War Savings for the Twelfth Federal Reserve district. If the 1918 certificate has blank spaces just put the certificate away without filling it with 1919 stamps.
 The same Thrift Stamps and Thrift Cards are used this year and when the Thrift Card holding 16 stamps is filled it will be exchanged for the 1919 War Savings Stamp on payment of the additional cents which represent the difference between the price of the War Savings Stamp and \$4, the value of the 16 Thrift Stamps.
 Where there is any doubt Director Hubbard advises questioning the local secretary of the War Savings Society or the postmaster.
 Eugene Newman of Shaniko, Oregon, plead guilty to the charge of trespass on the Santiam National Forest before the federal court, Portland, on February 24, and was fined \$25.00 by Federal Judge Wolvorton. The fine was immediately paid.
 Mr. Newman was in charge of a band of sheep grazing on national forest range, near Hog Rock, where he camped for the night. He started fires to hold the sheep together, and left next day without putting them out. A look-out man who discovered the fire reported it and forest rangers hurried to the scene and put it out before it did serious damage.
 Reedsport—New bank building started here. Rumored that two more lumber mills will start up soon.
 Hood River—Growers planning to increase pear acreage.
 Astoria—Pacific Power & Light Co., to install 4,500 h.p. electric generating plant here. Addition made necessary by erection of 3,000 barrel flouring mill for Astoria Flouring Mill company.
 Bend—Shevlin-Hixon logging road extension assured; contract closed for \$100,000 job; 150 men will be needed for six months.
 Eugene—Lane county ranch of 300 acres bought for \$42,000.
 Eugene—Farmer purchases 32 registered Cotswold sheep.
 Milton—Shields Fruit Co., takes over Valley Fruit company and incorporates; capital \$20,000.
