Red Soldier Just Kept a-Prayin' an' a-Runnin' an' a-Dodgin'.

Inferno of hot work in the line and the religious fervor of negroes, which never is far from the scene and this aspect of the fight still occupies a prominent place in the recollection of wounded negroes returning to this canton.

Their stories of the line and descriptions of the tight places were in are inged in almost every case by the conviction that violence intervened in their behalf.

Private Charles Walker of the infantry, a "raglin' prayeh" of one, was cited for his duty in carrying messages under fire when all the other members of his outfit had been killed.

"Jes' kep' a-prayin' an' a-run, an' a-dodgin'." he said, an' the sure kep' step wid me, but I jes how he done it. I jes daily played hide an' seek wid frog wid shells at ovah France, an'...

But w'en de biggest of all come appin' along I wuz right out in an' no shell hole nigh. Hon' goodness, hit wuz ex big ex me, I don't sight no' sure weah hit gwine I flop like a rabbit an' cuddle de yeth—reckon I land-utcher'n dat ol' shell did.

"Jes' laid theah a-talkin' to Jesus, an' I could on a-watchin' dat ol' all de time. I seen her fall'ly in' he'se'f outen de groun' er'lin' to bus". But, thank de good she quit er-humpin' an' er'lin' and crep' off' to she made' m'n' w'at she gwine do nex'."

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Water in which rice has been boiled is a capital thing to use for mixing.

Always keep your gas stove perfectly clean. Gas cannot give out heat through dirty burners.

When dishes used for cooking have become discolored, rub them with salt until all stain is removed.

Bake potatoes quickly, let them sit in boiling water for a few minutes before putting them in the oven.

Equal parts of paraffin and turpentine make a good and cheap furniture polish; be sure to shake the mixture before using.

Stains in linen should be washed in cold water—never in hot water, would make them almost impossible to remove.

Marble boiled in milk, portulaca, etc., will automatically stir the liquid cooks, to prevent burning.

HANG ON TO YOUR LIBERTY BONDS

Nothing short of pressing necessity should lead holders of Liberty bonds to sell them. In some parts of the country the sale of government bonds to purchase worthless or doubtful stocks has become an open scandal. Nothing is sacred against the wiles of the rapacious sharks who are inducing people to exchange their good government bonds for worthless "securities"—not even the patriotic sacrifice made by their victims to aid the country in its time of peril.

In other cases holders of Liberty bonds are selling them at a sacrifice to buy luxuries and indulgences. These people, perhaps thoughtlessly, are committing a three-fold wrong. They wrong their government by helping to hammer down its credit. They wrong other holders of government bonds, because every sale has a tendency to impair the market value of the whole government issue. And they wrong themselves and their families by frittering away their savings.

Bonds acquired by self-denial are in themselves of great value; but of greater value is the habit of saving inculcated in millions who never saved before. If that habit should now be broken the men and women, who break it will lose not only their savings, but in all probability will be turning from the road leading to competence and independence to the path of extravagance, which, though pleasant for the moment, leads on to dependence, poverty and a miserable old age.

REDUCING THE BRITISH ARMY

London, March 1.—The British army at home and abroad, exclusive of the force in India, now numbers 2,500,000 men and is being reduced to 952,000, according to a white paper issued by the government today.

The army of the Rhine, including troops in France and Belgium, will consist, after demobilization, of 23,600 officers and 380,000 men.
