There is no better, bigger or more important work to be undertaken by the state chamber than this, he said. "Oregon is entitled to more money from the federal government than she has received for the reclamation of land..."

From all parts of the United States, and particularly from the south and middle west inquiries are being received by the state chamber from prospective settlers...

"If Oregon can get its share of the money which the government will have available for reclamation purposes, so that lands may be made productive, this state will be able to provide good farms for settlers and they will come west in large numbers."

PIONEER OF OREGON ANSWERS FINAL CALL

Came Across Plains in 1852 and Settled in Oregon

Mrs. Esther Miller, mother of Mrs. S. E. Cooper, died at the residence of her daughter in this city, Tuesday morning at 4 o'clock. She was 86 years of age. Deceased came to St. Helens about six years ago and made her home with her daughter.

Mrs. Miller was a pioneer of Oregon. With her parents she crossed the plains in 1852 and the family settled at Crabtree in the Willamette valley. She is survived by her daughters, Mrs. S. E. Cooper of St. Helens, Mrs. L. P. Graham of Portland and Mrs. R. S. Bradley of Brothers, Oregon; and two sons, Henry Miller of Astoria, Oregon and Blufford Miller, who resides in St. Helens.
