It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he is hereby authorized and instructed to issue a General Fund warrant in the sum of \$50.00 in favor of Frank Pierce, this amount being one-half of the sum so allowed as indemnity.

Morton presents to the Court his written application asking for a two year contract at \$175.00 for the first year and \$200.00 for the second year. Mr. John Farr presents to the Court his application in person asking that he be granted the privilege of retaining the place for another year at the rental fee of \$175.00; and the Court being fully advised in the matter it is ordered that the application of Mr. S. C. Morton be, and the same is hereby denied.

It is further ordered by the Court that Mr. John Farr may retain said Poor Farm for another year upon paying into the County Treasurer the sum of \$175.00 for such rental. Whereupon Court adjourned to April 2nd, 1919.
