COMMUNITY SPIRIT

Any successful business organization impresses upon its employees that in order to make a success of the business and in order that the employees may share in the prosperity of the concern, it is necessary that there must be concerted action. All must work together to accomplish the same result, and that result is the success of the enterprise. This holds true in the case of a city, town or community. There must be a community spirit. The residents of the community must realize that anything which benefits the entire community benefits each and every individual in the community. Until recently St. Helens was lacking in the community spirit, but the Mist is glad to note a decided improvement and believes that the Chamber of Commerce through its 150 energetic and enthusiastic members is responsible for this change of feeling. It is to be hoped that this organization which is working so hard for the development of the county, will be successful, and with its success comes the development and prosperity of the entire community.

OUR BUSINESS OUTLOOK

Business conditions in St. Helens are good. The business men are optimistic and why shouldn't they be. A new mill is being built and will give employment to 50 or 60 men. One of the mills is running overtime and adding \$5,000 per month to their pay roll. Another mill is running double time and adding another \$5,000 or more to the pay roll. Many men are employed on road work. A large steamer will be built and not less than 100 men will have steady employment for 10 months or a year on this one job. St. Helens has no room for the pessimist.

THE ELECTION

From the election returns it is evident that the voters in Columbia county did not care to bond themselves for another eight or ten million dollars. The Mist does not blame them. One of the big measures was defeated, the Reconstruction Bonding Amendment. There was some good things in this, but the legislature inserted many items which were not good. In fact, the measure was like the omnibus bill that congress used to pass in order that every one might have a look in at the "pork barrel." The legislature did

the log rolling and the people repudiated their actions. The people of Columbia county, however, stamped their approval on the meritorious measures.

GREAT OUTLOOK FOR LUMBER

Every western state is interested in the better outlook for the lumber industry.

Farmers are pushing building because the same amount of produce will buy twice as much lumber as it would in 1914.

A 250-pound hog would buy 5250 shingles in 1914, and the same hog will buy 9000 shingles at present prices of pork.

In 1914 the money received from sale of 680 bushels of wheat would build a barn 28x38 feet.

That many bushels of wheat today will build the same barn, a thousand bushel grain house, an implement shed, a poultry house, and the farmer can buy a Ford roadster with the balance.

VETOED NEWSPAPER LIBEL LAW

Gov. Shoup of Colorado, who is democratic as an old shoe, seems to be a friend of the newspapers. He vetoed a drastic libel law put over by the legislature in an anti-free-press crusade. It is a remarkable fact that the socialistic and soviet-inclined reformers want to cripple a free press. It is gratifying to know that one western governor is not afraid of the power of the press.

Down in Cottage Grove, the mayor and city councilmen suggested to the residents of the town that they turn out emasse and clean up the city park. The citizens did it. The St. Helens City Park needs like work. The matter is respectfully called to the attention of Mayor Saxon and the councilmen.

It is a good idea to clean up and develop Columbia Beach. Nature has done her part in making the spot beautiful. Now let man do his part in making it accessible. It will be a great asset to the city to have Columbia Beach within reach for the residents of this community as well as the strangers who come to our city.
