**FOR CANADIAN WAR VETERANS**

Mist has received the follow-  
 ing letter which will be of interest  
 to any from this county who serve  
 in the Canadian forces:  
 St. Helens, Oregon, U. S. A.  
 Sir:  
 Great many men who served in  
 the Canadian Army are now resident  
 in the United States, particularly on  
 the Pacific coast.  
 Under the original Order in Coun-  
 cil relating to the payment of War  
 Gratitudes, men who did not  
 receive in France and men who  
 were discharged previous to the  
 signing of the armistice on Novem-  
 ber 11th, 1918, were not entitled to  
 gratuity in same.  
 Under a recent Order in Council  
 relating to the above mentioned  
 Order in Council, men who come under the above  
 Order in Council are now entitled to  
 gratuity.  
 Assistant District Paymaster  
 has advised me that a great many men  
 are entitled to gratuity under  
 the above Order in Council but have  
 not yet filed application for same.  
 I should appreciate it very much  
 if you could see your way clear to  
 advise these facts public through the  
 columns of your paper in the hope  
 that they might be read by some of  
 our men interested.  
 Any man who comes under the  
 above Order in Council will write me en-  
 closed copy of his discharge certificate  
 and I will be pleased to furnish him all  
 the necessary application forms.

**ORDINANCE NO. 238**

Ordinance giving to the St. Helens  
 Dock and Terminal Company,  
 its successors and assigns, the  
 perpetual right, privilege and  
 franchise to lay down, construct  
 and operate railway tracks and  
 sidetracks, and to operate  
 locomotives and cars thereover by  
 steam, electricity or other power,  
 upon, over and across all or  
 any part of the Columbia Street  
 south of the point where Colum-  
 bia Street intersects with the  
 southerly line of Cowlitz Street  
 and also all of Tualatin Street,  
 Plymouth Street, Casenau Street,  
 Oak Street, Winter Street,  
 Summer Street, Umattilla Street  
 and East Street, south of the north  
 line of Plymouth Street, and pub-  
 lic places within the City of St.  
 Helens, County of Columbia, State  
 of Oregon, for the transportation  
 of freight and, or passengers, and  
 to authorize the construction, in-  
 stallation and maintenance of  
 tracks, bridges, stations and other  
 necessary and convenient things  
 for the construction, maintenance  
 and operation thereof.

**"THE CITY OF ST. HELENS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:"**

Section 1. That there be, and is  
 hereby granted unto the St. Helens  
 Dock and Terminal Company, a cor-  
 poration organized and existing un-  
 der the laws of the State of Oregon,  
 its successors and assigns, the  
 perpetual right, privilege and fran-  
 chise to lay down, construct, equip,  
 own, maintain and operate railway  
 tracks and sidetracks, and to operate  
 locomotives and cars thereover by  
 steam, electricity, or other power, in,  
 upon, over and across the following  
 named streets and places, for the  
 transportation of freight, and, or  
 passengers, and to authorize the con-  
 struction, installation and mainte-  
 nance of depots and stations and a  
 drawbridge over what is commonly  
 called Kern Canal, in the City of St.  
 Helens, County of Columbia, State  
 of Oregon, to-wit: on all of Columbia  
 Street south of the point where Colum-  
 bia Street intersects with the  
 southerly line of Cowlitz Street and  
 also all of Tualatin Street, Plymouth  
 Street, Casenau Street, Oak Street,  
 Winter Street, Summer Street, Uma-  
 tilla Street and East Street, south of  
 the north line of Plymouth Street, and  
 public places within the City of St.  
 Helens, County of Columbia, State  
 of Oregon, for the transportation  
 of freight and, or passengers, and  
 to authorize the construction, in-  
 stallation and maintenance of  
 tracks, bridges, stations and other  
 necessary and convenient things  
 for the construction, maintenance  
 and operation thereof.

Section 2. That said St. Helens  
 Dock and Terminal Company, its  
 successors and assigns, shall lay  
 down, construct, maintain and op-  
 erate said tracks so as to conform to  
 the grade of the streets over which  
 said tracks shall be constructed and  
 in such manner as shall not inter-  
 fere unnecessarily with the public  
 use thereof; and in the event that  
 the said City of St. Helens shall  
 change or alter the grade or grades  
 of said street or streets, the said St.  
 Helens Dock and Terminal Company,  
 its successors and assigns, will re-  
 arrange its tracks to conform thereto.  
 Section 3. The said St. Helens  
 Dock and Terminal Company, its  
 successors and assigns, shall have the  
 right to do all the excavating, grad-  
 ing or filling for the construction, re-  
 pair or maintenance of said tracks,  
 but all portions of said streets so ex-  
 cavated or graded, or that may now  
 be paved, must be replaced in their  
 original condition as nearly as prac-  
 ticable. And said St. Helens Dock  
 and Terminal Company, its success-  
 ors and assigns, shall keep its por-  
 tion of said streets upon which tracks  
 are maintained, in as good condition  
 of repair as the remainder of said  
 streets are maintained. The specific  
 portion of said streets to be so kept  
 in repair being the space between the  
 rails and for a space of 30 inches out-  
 side of each rail.

Section 4. The said St. Helens  
 Dock and Terminal Company, its  
 successors and assigns, shall not per-  
 mit unused or dead cars or engines  
 to stand upon or across any streets  
 over which said privilege is granted  
 longer than is reasonably necessary.  
 Read first time in full, August 11,  
 1919.  
 Read second time by title only,  
 August 11, 1919.  
 Read third time and passed the  
 Council, August 18, 1919.
