Crosswell—Apple crop surpassing expectations. Storage and manufacturing capacity are not able to care of crop.

Marshfield—Mountain States Power Company closes contract for 200 horsepower electricity to the Western Lumber & Manufacturing company, which plant starting double shift operations.

The largest shipment of Scotch pine boilers ever made from a Pacific Coast city to the Orient will be Portland this week when the steamer Dollar, a 10,000-ton British steamer, calls for 13 boilers built by Willamette Iron & Steel works of the Emergency Fleet corporation. Shipment, valued at more than \$6,000, is for Emergency Fleet under construction at Shanghai, China.

Plans are progressing for a short snappy campaign for members, ending November 6 and ending December 11. Headquarters for the drive in the counties of Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, Columbia, Yamhill, are in Portland, as the campaign in these localities is under supervision of Portland chapter.

This Red Cross drive will differ from campaigns during the war, as it is for memberships only. It is an endeavor to raise money by donations, as all that is asked is one dollar per member. This will be used to carry on the home service of the Red Cross for the coming year.

The American Legion, both nationally and locally, is cooperating with the Red Cross in this drive; the boys who served in the war realizing better than anyone the valuable work of this organization, desire to show their appreciation in some concrete form by aiding in this campaign.
