MAN SUFFRAGE IN 1919-1920.

Jan. 24 — A bill extending the franchise of women in Presidential elections signed by the Governor of Minnesota.
 Feb. 2 — The French Chamber rejects two woman suffrage amendments to the Electoral Reform bill.
 April 22 — The Pennsylvania House passes woman suffrage amendment to the State Constitution.
 May 31 — In the American Congress the House passes the woman suffrage amendment to the constitution by a vote of 304 to 89, showing a relative gain since January, 1915, when the vote was 274 to 139.
 June 4 — The U. S. Senate adopts the woman suffrage amendment to the constitution by more than the necessary two-thirds vote, 56 to 25. The amendment having already passed the House, it goes to the State Legislatures for ratification.
 July 10 — Illinois is the first State to ratify the woman suffrage amendment; then come Wisconsin and Michigan.
 New York and Ohio.
 July 17 — The Illinois Legislature corrects an error and ratifies the amendment a second time.
 July 24 — Pennsylvania completes ratification of the amendment.



COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS JANUARY 12, 1920.

City council met on above date, all officers being present. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. The marshal reported the sewer near the residence of J. W. McDonald in Columbia Park repaired and in working order.
 The matter of the unsafe condition of the sidewalk west of D. W. Richardson residence was discussed and a motion made and carried that the marshal serve notice on the property owners to make the necessary repairs, and if they failed to act, to make the repairs and the cost thereof to be entered as a lien against the property.
 The matter of improving McCormick street was brought up but no action taken.
 In the matter of the remonstrance of the improvement of West Street. The question was discussed at length, and it appearing that several property owners had signed the remonstrance thinking they were signing a petition for said improvement, and that some had been wrongfully informed, a motion was made and carried that the matter be laid over until next meeting and that the city attorney be instructed to prepare a petition for the property owners to circulate among the persons who desired to take their names from the remonstrance, and present the petition at the next meeting of the council.
 J. W. Akin asked the council to erect a building 50x100 adjoining the city dock, and he and others would lease the same at a reasonable rental from the city. The matter was laid upon the table until the next meeting. No further business appearing, upon motion made and carried, the council adjourned.
