Chairman of the Street Committee that several of the side-walks reported defective had been filed.

Engineer Collier of the Highway, stated that if the proposed street light poles were placed on the right of way of the highway, would interfere with the traffic thereon, and possibly be a menace, and objected to the placing of said poles on the right of way. The same was discussed and suggested that private owners of property along the highway make arrangements to place the poles on private property.

The question of the private sewer in Block 19, was taken up and discussed at length by the Council and property owners in said block, and a motion was made and seconded that a sewer district be formed in said block comprised of the lots owned by Gus Lopez, H. Morgan, and W. W. Blakesey. Motion carried by the following vote: Dixon, No; O'Connor, Yes; Wheeler, Yes; Larabee, Yes.

The question of placing a pole for a street light at the foot of the stairway on Casneau street, was taken up and discussed, and a motion made and carried that a light pole be installed at said point.

A communication was received from Congressman W. C. Hawley that in the River and Harbor Bill passed by the House of Representatives provisions were made for the improvement and connection of deep water in the Willamette Slough, and deep water in the Columbia River including any proposal of co-operation.
