measure which comes before the voters on May 21st. From a long article treating on this subject we make the following excerpt:

It is reasonable to assume that if the colleges are permitted to go to seed, at least one-third of the students who otherwise would be sent there would be sent to institutions outside the state. At a minimum expense of \$800 per year per student, the state would lose \$1,620,000 per annum from 1,800 students. As the actual expense per student probably would average far in excess \$800 a year, counting railroad fares from outside institutions, it is certain that the direct annual economic loss to the state would be at least the amount indicated.

It is also certain that of those students sent outside the state to be educated, a proportion would locate elsewhere for life, and the state would lose that very intelligent part of its population and its creative and earning power for all time to come. This is no small item, especially in its effect on the development of the state and its property values.

There would be another 1,000 potential students. It is reasonable to estimate, who would not go to college at all if deprived of the opportunity for a first class collegiate education within the state. The earning and creative power of this number of students would be diminished for the state for their lifetime. Neither is this a small item.

For the remaining 2,000 students who could be accommodated within the limited facilities of inferior institutions, there would be an inferior quality of instruction. Their creative and earning power would be correspondingly diminished, to the economic loss of the state.
