WEED NOTICE

TO OWNERS AND OCCUPANTS OF LAND:

If you find any Canada thistle, Russian thistle, Chinese thistle or quack-grass growing on your premises, you are required to completely remove them, and if you find them growing on premises other than your

own you may report such fact to the Road Supervisor of your district. Such weeds should be removed before any of them has shed its bloom or commenced to form seed. Chapter 287 of the General Laws of Oregon provides that if such weeds are not removed within ten days after notice, they may be removed by the person appointed by the County Court at the expense of the person owning or occupying the premises and become a lien on the land.
