

WILL DISTRIBUTE VICTORY MEDALS

War Department Will Present All Ex-Service Men With Medals on Armistice Day—Presentation Ceremony by American Legion.

Under arrangements just completed with the War Department, the American Legion become the instrument for distribution of the Victory medals which the government is presenting to every American soldier, sailor, marine, field clerk or nurse who served honorably for any period between April 6, 1917, and Nov. 11, 1918.

The presentations will take place on Armistice Day in a series of simultaneous ceremonies to be held under auspices throughout the world, making possible a stupendous celebration which is destined to eclipse anything of the kind ever before attempted in the United States. The Legion hopes to make the event the greatest of all Armistice Days, the most impressive and memorable patriotic function in which Americans ever participated and one planned to live in history as an epochal milestone in the nation's life. It is planned that not only members of the Legion but all ex-service men and the next of kin of those who died or lost their lives in battle, will join their comrades and their countrymen in a united tribute to the spirit of America and the anniversary of the day in 1918 which marked that nation's supreme achievement.

It is not with vanity but with wholesome pride in the triumph of arms in the most crucial test of strength in history," writes Franklin D. Roosevelt, National Commander of the Legion, in a letter to all department heads urging enthusiastic participation in the celebration, "that the nation appeals to all Americans to join our 1920 Armistice Day memorial throughout the years to come. We want it to be a tribute, above all, to our country and our flag, the flags of our heroic allies. In all higher sense, it should be a memorial, affectionate dedication of our lives to the principles for which more than 100,000 of our countrymen and women of our comrades in arms made the supreme and final sacrifice. The Legion since it is 'the splendid' who served America because they loved America, can appropriately take the initiative in this movement. And because the Legion is a representative cross-section of national citizenship, it is confident that Americans generally will heartily co-operate to make celebration a success."

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YOUNGEST PEAK
UNDERGOING CHANGE

No longer can we speak affectionately of Mount St. Helens, the "big dish of ice cream," according to R. J. Grace, president of the Trails club, for the perfect profile of its summit has recently undergone a decided change. The former contour has disappeared and perfect symmetry is destroyed by a large depression near the crater rim, as well as a small peak which may be seen at the extreme eastern edge of the summit.

Members of the Trails club who recently ascended Larch mountain to view St. Helens were amazed at the appreciable change in its appearance. The new ridge, which, according to Mr. Grace, was caused by the constant freezing and thawing of the glaciers, may be seen from Portland. It is located on the extreme eastern rim of the summit and forms the eastern end of the notch in the crater rim.

Studying the mountain with powerful glasses, the observer found that it is now possible to see into the shallow side of the summit. The eastern side of the notch forms the small peak, which may also be seen from the city.

According to Mr. Grace, the summit of St. Helens is now undergoing the same transformation as did Mount Hood long ago, and its former perfect cone will some day be destroyed in the same manner. Each summer, points out Mr. Grace, the annual thawing of the mountain's glaciers begins and as the glacier slowly moves down the side of the peak it carries with it tons of rock and debris. An avalanche is then caused and loosely-held projections are dislodged to join the fall of the larger body of debris. Belief that the fall of rock is due to volcanic action is erroneous, explained Mr. Grace.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

St. Helens, Oregon, June 21, 1920.

The city council met on the above date in regular session. Present: Magnus Saxon, mayor; Robert Dixon, James O'Connor, C. L. Wheeler, Councilmen; E. E. Quick, city recorder; Geo. Potter, city marshal; J. W. Day, city attorney.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Reports: Marshal reported that the city park had been placed in proper order for the Fourth of July celebration.

In the matter of the report of Dr. L. G. Ross, health officer, on the sanitary condition of the proposed city dumping ground he reported that he examined the same and found that if properly cared for each week during the summer months that he could see no objections to the establishing of the same, and suggested that no animal or vegetable matter be included in the garbage deposit, he also suggested that all other garbage that could be cremated be so treated.

In the matter of the application of building permits: Application was received from W. M. White to erect a dwelling on Lot 6 Block 79; and also an application was received from L. Rosasco to erect a frame dwelling house on Lot 2 Block 123; the building committee recommended that permits be issued.

Application for hotel license: An application was received from Matt Johnson for a license to operate what is known as the Kaleva hotel located on Lot 19 Block 19. On motion made and carried the license was ordered issued.

In the matter of the purchase of certain lots in the city for dumping purposes: An ordinance providing for the purchase of certain lots in the city of St. Helens, Columbia County, Oregon, for the use of said city upon which to dump and destroy rubbish, garbage, etc., was read the third time in full and on motion made and carried was put on its final passage and passed by the following vote: Dixon, yes; O'Connor, yes; Wheeler, yes; Larabee, absent, and was declared by the mayor passed. Approved and signed by him and attested by recorder.

In the matter of shooting firecrackers within the city limits the same was discussed by the council, and it was suggested that the mayor publish notice of proclamation forbidding the use of firecrackers, cannons, etc., during the celebration of the Fourth of July, and that the Marshal be instructed to enforce the same.

In the matter of the expediting of the books of the recorder and city treasurer, a motion made and carried that Crandall & Roberts be employed to expedite the books.

Sherman Miles appeared before the council in behalf of the Fourth of July committee and asked the city to make an appropriation sufficient to purchase lumber for the construction of a hydroplane landing, the committee to supply the necessary labor. The request was granted.

In the matter of repairing sidewalks: This matter was taken up and discussed by the council and it was suggested that when a notice was served to repair sidewalks that a copy of the same be retained and placed on file in the recorder's office for reference.

In the matter of preparing the dumpage ground for the proper care of garbage, the same was taken up and discussed and referred to the street committee and marshal to see that the same was put in proper shape.

No further business appearing, a motion made and carried the meeting adjourned.

St. Helens, Oregon, June 28, 1920.

The city council met on the above date in regular session, in the city hall, St. Helens, Oregon. Present: Magnus Saxon, mayor; Robert Dixon, James O'Connor, C. L. Wheeler, Councilmen; E. E. Quick, city recorder; George Potter, city marshal; J. W. Day, city attorney.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

Reports: The marshal reported that the lights on the old floating dock should be removed to the new city dock. The recorder was instructed to notify the Light and Power company to remove said light to the new dock.

Councilman Wheeler brought up the question of defective sidewalks which was discussed, and the marshal instructed to serve notice to owners to repair the same.

Mrs. S. M. Weigel was present and asked the council to fix or have fixed the sewer into Nigger creek near her residence, as the same was broken, and that the logs of a boat house rested on the sewer, the same was discussed, and the council informed her that the matter would be attended to as soon as possible.

The city engineer filed his report and acceptance of the improvement of Columbia street, from its intersection with Cowlitz street, extending southerly with its intersection with Tualatin street, done by the Warren Construction company. The city recorder was instructed to publish notice of the same by charter required.

This being the time set by the council for the hearing of objections to the improvement of Cowlitz, Casneau, and Oak streets and Tualatin street, and no objections having been made or filed by the owners of property abutting on said streets, the council proceeded to examine the estimate of cost, together with the plat filed by the city engineer, a motion was made and carried that the engineer be requested to figure improvement front foot per lot, except portion in concrete, at 35 per cent of Cowlitz street, between Casneau and Columbia streets, and 50 per cent of Casneau street where concrete is laid, to be levied over balance of lot, and was laid over until next meeting of the council.

The city engineer filed a report of the 20 per cent balance due L. O. Herrold, for contract work, to-wit: \$1097.58, and on motion made and carried, a warrant for the amount was ordered drawn on the city treasurer in payment thereof.

No further business appearing on motion made and carried the meeting adjourned.

SUMMONS

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF COLUMBIA.

To Helen S. Hynson, Defendant: In the Name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above-entitled suit on or before the 21st day of August, 1920, and if you fail to answer for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the court for a decree granting the relief prayed for in his complaint, to-wit, for a decree of divorce forever dissolving the marriage contract heretofore and now existing between plaintiff and defendant, and plaintiff pay to the defendant the sum of Thirty-five (\$35.00) per month for the support and maintenance of Henry Lee Hynson, minor child of plaintiff and defendant.
