



NATION STATE CONVENTION

Preparations are being made in St. Helens for the big week-end in the history of that city when the American Legion will hold its annual convention July 30 and 31.

On Sunday night the main event will be a pyrotechnic display, "The Battle of the Argonne," which will last two hours.

The fireworks display, cost \$1,000, will last two hours. The battle of the Argonne will be the main event of the convention. The features of the convention provide ample entertainment for the legionnaires.

Great interest in the public problem will be the patriotic and his parade, which is to be held Friday afternoon. Practically every business firm in the city, every commercial and civic organization has promised entries for the parade.

A number of the legion posts about the state have signified their intention of entering floats. Pennington will enter an old stage coach, and 600 to 700 "Gobs" from the ships of the Pacific fleet will line up, as well as the soldiers from the mouth of the Columbia.

PHLET ON LOCAL SERVICE

The request of the American Legion for a pamphlet containing information on the local service of Red Cross chapters has been prepared at the national headquarters for distribution by the legion to each of its 100 local posts. In order that they may understand just what the legion is undertaking in peace and war, and may see how the legion as an entity and through individual members, can work together to bring about the Americanism for which both nations stand.

The pamphlet deals only with those services which local chapters are rendering to communities and does not attempt to cover the many important activities with which the Red Cross is concerned, such as foreign relief, war and famine stricken areas, home service to the regiments in camps and hospitals, and supplying nurses for army, navy and United States health service, dietitians for army and social service workers, and States public health hospital in disasters and foreign relief information service.

The pamphlet are listed and the eight forms of Red Cross service which are being undertaken by the chapters and branches according to the needs, means and equipment of the communities. These are: Nursing service, health education, health centers, health education, service, information service, Red Cross disaster preparedness production and emergency. In addition are statements why every American community should have a Red Cross.

Will Cross does not assume to be the entire field," the pamphlet says. "There is more to be done in the future and all the organizations can possibly accomplish. The Red Cross chapter is eager to do any local cooperative movement of federation of social service which will bring the most leverage to bear upon solving problems, preventing the loss of life and raising the standards of life."

TURN OF SOLDIER DEAD

Three rulings in regard to the bodies of the American soldiers that died overseas back home.

All bodies of deceased soldiers are buried in Germany, Luxembourg, Northern Russia are to be sent back to this country.

All bodies of deceased soldiers are buried in other countries, are to be brought back on relatives request that the be left abroad.

All bodies of deceased soldiers are buried in France are to be sent back only upon the request of nearest relatives.

The American Red Cross has arranged to have the bodies of soldiers of kin at the time of the war. The war department will notify the Red Cross, will transmit the information to the service section in the way it is expected that the war will be able to get in touch with relatives to whom the remains of vital importance far in advance to allow sufficient time for the completion of all arrangements for burial.

DO YOU LOSE ANYTHING?

Cross chapters throughout the country have been asked to aid in the owners of a large amount of miscellaneous mail material had been sent to France members of the A. E. F., but had been returned for various reasons, and has piled up in the office of the adjutant general at Washington, D. C. Clothing, jewelry, pens, safety razors, pipes, boots, belts, money, in fact everything which could be through the mails is contained in this collection.

Previous efforts to return portions of this mail to senders or to have it destroyed have been unsuccessful. It is hoped that persons who reason to believe that their property may be among these articles will communicate with the adjutant general at Washington, giving details by which identification of the property may be made, and it may be returned to them.

HEALTH EXHIBITS AT FAIR

Red Cross and four allied organizations met recently at Yakima, Wash., to discuss the nature of the health exhibits to be shown at the state fair this fall. It was decided to run the different exhibits independently of each other, but with the idea of community health improvement, according to Richard Cadbury, Jr., executive secretary of the Yakima valley chapter of the Red Cross.

The five organizations represented at the meeting will work in cooperation with each other, he said, putting on educational "movies," and moving exhibits to bring out facts dealing with health matters.

ORDINANCE NO. 250.

AN ORDINANCE providing for grading and paving the intersections of certain streets in the City of St. Helens, Oregon; letting the contract therefor; and providing for the payment thereof out of the general fund of said City; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, the County of Columbia, State of Oregon, is about to grade and pave the County road which traverses St. Helens street from the westerly line of Columbia street in the City of St. Helens, Oregon, westerly to Oak street in said City, and thence northerly along Oak street to its intersection with Willamette street in said City, excepting the intersections of the various streets along said route;

AND WHEREAS, the Common Council of said City deem it expedient to improve by grading and paving, said intersections of St. Helens and Caspau streets, St. Helens and Oak streets, and of Oak and Willamette streets in said City, the whole improvement to be in accordance with the plans on file with the County Roadmaster for said County;

AND WHEREAS, said Common Council is in receipt of plans, and specifications and estimates of the probable cost of such improvement, the estimated cost of which is \$1795.26; and the Common Council having examined said plans, specifications and estimates, and having found the same to be satisfactory in all particulars;

NOW THEREFORE, the City of St. Helens does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the City of St. Helens, Oregon, in pursuance of its Charter, it is hereby authorized and empowered to grade and pave 551 square yards of the intersection of St. Helens street and Caspau street; the intersection of St. Helens street and Oak street; and the intersection of Oak street and Willamette street all in the City of St. Helens, Oregon; and said Common Council is further empowered and authorized to advertise for bidders for such work and thereafter enter into a contract with the party tendering the best bid for said grading and paving at a cost of not to exceed \$1795.26.

Section 2. That upon the completion of said grading and paving according to said plans and specifications the Common Council of said City shall immediately, or as soon thereafter as an Ordinance therefor shall become effective draw a warrant or warrants upon the general fund of said City for the amount due to the contractor performing said work.

Section 3. Inasmuch as Columbia County has advertised for bids for the paving of its County road extending to and from said intersections, and it is expedient that said intersections be paved at the same time, not only making a better job at a much reduced cost, but also obviating palpable dangers arising from the unfinished condition of such intersections, thus endangering the public peace, health and safety of the City and people thereof, it is therefore declared and ordained that an emergency exists and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the Mayor of said City.
