fourth Saturday of the month is given over by the grange for the enjoyment of the young folk and they are having advantage of the chance to present.

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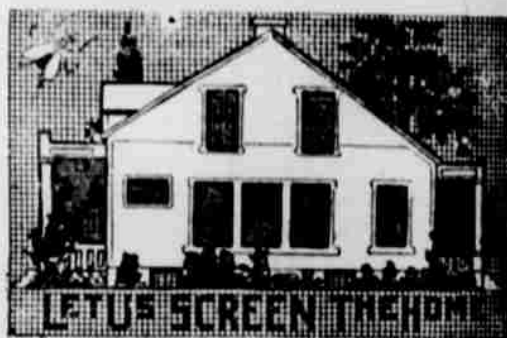

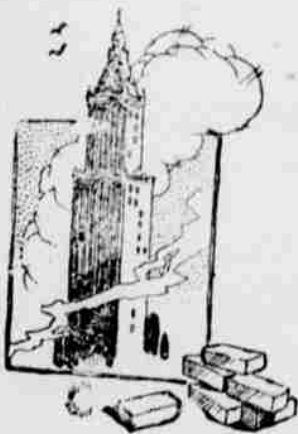
