

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

St. Helens, Oregon, July 31, 1920.

The City Council met on the above date pursuant to adjournment in regular session. Present: Magnus Saxon, Mayor; Robert Dixon, James O'Connor, C. L. Wheeler, N. O. Larabee, Councilmen; E. E. Quick, city recorder; George Potter, city marshal; absent: J. W. Day, city attorney, absent.

The minutes of the last regular meetings were read and after corrections, approved.

Reports: Councilman Dixon reported on the bill of the St. Helens Light & Power company which had been laid over for investigation, and recommended that the bill be paid. A motion was made and carried that a warrant be issued on the city treasurer in payment thereof in the sum of \$12.00.

Councilman Wheeler reported that party on the hill had asked for permission to connect with the sewer, which was readily granted; also reported that some standing trees on the hill were a menace to some of the dwellings. Parties were authorized to cut them down.

In the matter of the erection of a water tank in West St. Helens, by the Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railroad Co., this matter was brought up by Councilman Larabee, stating that the company were making preparations for the erection of water tank near his residence and others, and that the residents were objecting to the erection of the same at this point. He asked that some action be taken by the council, the recorder was instructed to write a letter to said railroad company asking them to change the location of said tank as a number of residents objected thereto.

An application was received from A. Crouse for a building permit to erect a bungalow on lot 12, block 14 permit ordered issued.

An application was received from E. Cooper to erect a small barn on lot 5 block 107. Permit ordered issued.

An ordinance providing for grading and paving the intersections of certain streets in the city, letting the contract therefor and providing for payment thereof out of the general fund, was introduced and read the first time in full, and on motion made and carried was read the second time by title only.

In the matter of connecting the lines on lot 15 block 43 with the sewer (the property of W. B. Dillard), this matter was brought up by Councilman Wheeler stating that serious complaints had been made of the unsanitary condition of said lines on said lot, and that it would soon become a menace, if not ready, the recorder was instructed to notify the owner of the property (sympathically) to connect with the sewer.

An ordinance apportioning and assessing the cost of the improvement on Winter street from its intersection with Tualatin street, south intersection of Plymouth street, was introduced and read the first time in full, and on motion made and carried was read the second time by title only.

A resolution to improve Winter street from its intersection with Hemlock street, east to its intersection with Columbia street, was introduced and read and on motion made and carried, passed, and the recorder was instructed to proceed in accordance with the Charter provided in such matters.

A resolution to improve Winter street from its intersection with Willamette street north 455 feet; same was introduced and read, and on motion made and carried, passed, and the recorder was instructed to proceed in accordance with the Charter provided in such matters.

An ordinance providing for the issue of improvement bonds of the City of St. Helens, Oregon, in the sum of \$755,100 providing and proving the form of the bonds to be issued and the coupons attached thereto; providing for the advertisement and sale of said bonds, and during an emergency.

Was introduced and read in full the first time, and on motion made and carried was read the second time by title only.

In the matter of apportioning and assessment of the improvement on Winter, Cowitz, Oak and Tualatin streets: This matter was taken up for discussion, and a motion made and carried that the city engineer be requested to apportion and assess the improvements on the above named streets, using the data prepared by Mr. Gill in his report and recommendations. No further business appearing on motion made and carried meeting adjourned.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS

To the owners of the real property subject to assessment for the improvement proposed in the following resolution, herewith attached and made a part of this notice:

You are hereby notified that pursuant to said resolution and the provisions of the Charter of the City of St. Helens, Oregon, that you may and you are hereby requested to make and file with the Recorder of said City of St. Helens, within twenty days from the date of the first publication of this notice and resolution, to-wit: within twenty days from July 23rd, 1920, your remonstrance or remonstrances against the proposed improvement or grade mentioned in said Resolution:

Whereas, the Common Council of the City of St. Helens, Oregon, deeming it expedient to improve all that portion of Wyeth street from the center line of Hemlock street to the east boundary line of Columbia street, all in the City of St. Helens, Oregon, by clearing, grubbing, grading and paving the same, the paving to be of crushed rock, and the whole improvement to be in accordance with the maps, plans, profiles and specifications on file in the office of the City Recorder of said City; and Whereas, the Engineer of said City on the 12th day of July, 1920, at the request of said Common Council, filed in the office of the City Recorder of said City maps, plans, profiles and specifications of such improvement, and at said time also filed an estimate of the probable cost of such improvement, which cost thereof is estimated by said City Engineer to be in the sum of \$5472.20; and

Whereas, the Common Council of said City having examined said maps, plans, profiles and specifications and the estimate of the probable cost of such improvement, find the same to be satisfactory in all particulars without making any change or changes therein:

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the Common Council of the City of St. Helens, Oregon, that that portion of Wyeth street from the center line of Hemlock street to the east boundary line of Columbia street in said City, be improved by clearing, grubbing, grading and paving the same with crushed rock, all in accordance with the established grade and the maps, plans, profiles and specifications of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder of said City; and said Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portion of said Wyeth street, and it is its intention to so improve the same.

And Be It Further Resolved, that the Common Council of said City adopt and approve said plans, maps, profiles and specifications and it also adopts and approves the estimate and probable cost of said improvement, which as is above shown is \$5472.20.

And Be It Further Resolved, that the cost of said improvement be levied upon and assessed against all the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land specially benefited by such improvement as required and directed by the

Charter of said City; and it is hereby determined and declared that all the lots of land specially benefited, directly or indirectly are the following, to-wit: Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22 and the southerly one-half of Lots 6 and 17, all in Block 15; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22 and the southerly one-half of Lots 6 and 17 all in Block 29; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22, and the southerly one-half of Lots 6 and 17, in Block 30; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22, and the southerly one-half of Lots 6 and 17, in Block 45; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22, and the southerly one-half of Lots 6 and 17, in Block 46; Lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and the northerly one-half of Lots 6 and 17, all in Block 16; Lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and the northerly one-half of Lots 6 and 17, all in Block 28; Lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 and the northerly one-half of Lots 6 and 17, in Block 31; Lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and the northerly one-half of Lots 6 and 17, all in Block 47, all in the City of St. Helens, in Columbia County, Oregon; and all of said lots and parts of lots above described are hereby deemed to be specially and directly benefited by such improvement.

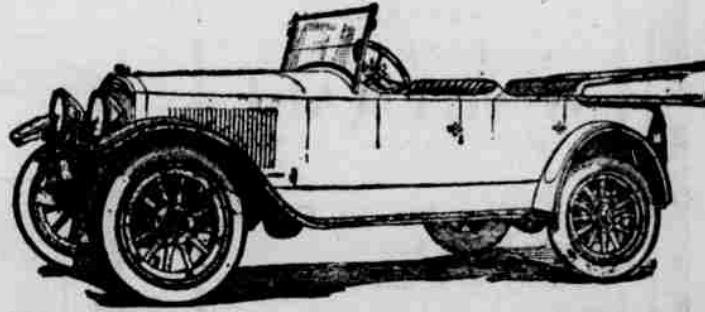
