COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

St. Helens, Oregon, July 26, 1920. The city council met on the above date in regular session. Present: Mayor, Robert Dixon; Councilmen: C. L. Wheeler, Larabee, Councilmen; E. M. City recorder; George Potter, marshal; J. W. Day, city attorney.

Minutes of the last regular session were read and after several amendments approved.

The marshal reported several side-walks had been repaired.

A question of several defective sidewalks on West street was taken up and discussed, and the council was instructed to tear out defective sidewalks on said street.

Engineer Wheeler brought up a question of the connection with the premises located on lot 43 block 43, the property of W. Dillard who had been notified to connections, who claimed he did not come within the provisions of the ordinance requiring connection to be made. The same was discussed and the engineer instructed to ascertain whether the premises within the provisions of the ordinance.

A question of the assessment for improvements made on Caseman, Oak street and Tualatin was brought up and discussed by the council. Mr. Gill of Portland, others, and was laid over until next meeting of the council.

Communication was received from J. H. Flynn, relative to the made by Matilda J. Ross to the city certain camping on the highway near the city of Liberty, and was discussed by the council and others, and was referred to the street committee to report thereon.

Application for a building permit was read from A. M. Bobec to a bungalow on lot 5 block 75. The council ordered issued.

Application for a building permit was read from the Congregation church membership to build a church on lot 22 block 16. Permit ordered issued.

Application for an automobile to operate a passenger automobile through and upon the streets of the city of St. Helens carrying passengers and baggage from Portland and ways points to Rainier and points and from Rainier and points to Portland, Oregon. On the same and carried a license ordered issued therefor.

A. R. Spearow brought up a question of improving the athletic field near the school house, by building drinking fountain, and the council to add the same, was discussed and a motion was made and seconded that the aid in the matter provided by the water commission go 50-50 further provided that the cost not exceed the sum of \$45.00. An amended and carried.

The matter of the publication of resolution to improve a portion of street from its intersection with William street, this matter discussed by the council and it appearing that the resolution already printed did not all the property benefitted, a motion was made and carried that the former resolution be amended and that another resolution, the present one be corrected to

cover all property benefitted thereby.

In the matter of the acceptance of the deed from L. Rosasco for dumping purpose for the city. It appearing that the ordinance authorizing the purchase of certain lots for dumping purposes by the city was now in effect, and that the ordinance provided for the payment thereof, a motion was made and carried that the recorder be instructed to draw a warrant in favor of said L. Rosasco in the sum of \$900.00 on the general fund in payment therefor.

In the matter of the balance due the Warren Construction company on contract work, this matter was brought up by the city engineer and it appearing that there was due said company a balance of \$1953.95 a motion was made and carried that a warrant be drawn on the treasurer in payment of the same.

An ordinance providing for grading and paving the intersections of certain streets in the city of St. Helens, Oregon, letting the contract therefor and providing for the payment thereof out of the general fund of said city and declaring an emergency was introduced and read the first time in full, and on motion made and carried was read the second time by title only, and on motion made and carried was read the third time in full and put on its final passage, and was passed by the following vote: Dixon, yes; O'Conner, yes; Wheeler, yes; Larabee, yes; and was signed and approved by the mayor and attested by the recorder.

An ordinance apportioning and assessing the cost of the improvement of Winter street in the city of St. Helens, Oregon, from its intersection with Tualatin street south to its intersection with Plymouth street, upon the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land abutting upon said improvement recently completed under Ordinance No. 232 was introduced and read the first time in full, and on motion made and carried was put on its final passage and was passed by the following vote: Dixon, yes; O'Conner, yes; Wheeler, yes; Larabee, yes; and was signed and approved by the mayor, and attested by the recorder.

An ordinance providing for the issuance of improvement bonds of the city of St. Helens, Oregon, in the sum of \$755.10, providing and approving the form of the bonds to be issued and the coupons attached thereto; providing for the advertisement and sale of said bonds, and declaring an emergency was introduced and read the first time in full, and on motion made and carried was read the second time by title only, and on motion made and carried was read the third time in full and put on its final passage and was passed by the following vote: Dixon, yes; O'Conner, yes; Wheeler, yes; Larabee, yes; and was signed and approved by the mayor, and attested by the recorder.

In the matter of leave of absence of the city recorder for about ten days, the recorder made a request that he be granted a leave of absence for ten days and had secured J. B. Godfrey to take his place for that time, on motion made and carried leave of absence was granted him.

No further business appearing on motion made and carried the meeting adjourned.

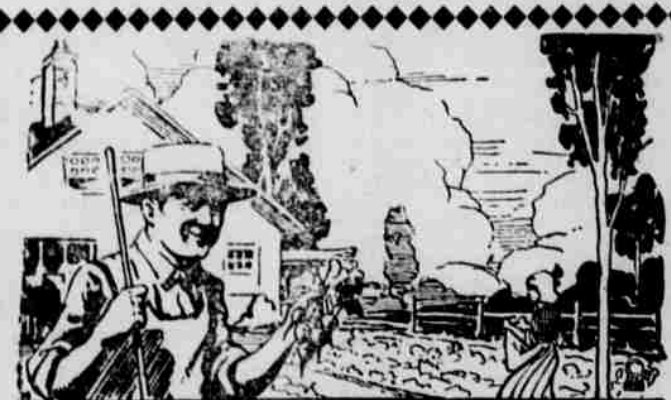
