HOUSEHOLD HINTS

A cloth wet in kerosene will remove automobile grease from woolen goods if rubbed lightly over the soiled surface. It will not affect colors.

When shoes are wet, stuff them with pieces of crumpled newspaper. This absorbs the moisture and prevents the shoes from becoming stiff when dry.

Cornstarch is better for thickening gravy, as it should not jump as badly as flour does.

A few drops of vinegar put into fat before frying doughnuts will prevent their "soaking fat."

Steam brown bread in a double boiler. It takes less room on the stove and less attention.

For soiled handkerchiefs, place in basin of water one handful of salt, add teaspoonful of washing powder. Let set on back of stove for half an hour, then rinse and blue them.

If the sink garbage pail or drainer is kept lined with newspaper it will be easier to clean.

Iodine stains may be removed by using peroxide. Apply several times until the stain is gone.
