Twenty Years Ago

In the Files of The Oregon Mist August 17, 1900.)

P. A. Frakes and daughter, of Seapooose spent this week, going down with the hope of getting Miss Frakes' health better. It has been quite poor. Merrill of Deer Island was about a dozen plums one last week, the variety of which is not known. The fruit is a red and in appearance is very like the peach plum. Its flavor is delicious and no doubt will prove a valuable addition to the horticultural varieties.

A. Wikstrom has reopened the shop in this city, and is carrying on a choice variety of meats. No doubt Mr. Wikstrom's venture will be successful. People here are pleased that an opportunity is afforded for being supplied with fresh meats. The fishing season has closed and altogether it has been a very successful season. The pack is somewhat short, but fishermen in this vicinity report a financially successful season throughout. One who operated a small seine a mile up the river is reported to have taken 56 tons of fish since the season opened, for which he received a price of \$120 per ton.

Twenty-Five Years Ago

In the Files of The Oregon Mist August 23, 1895.)

(From the Files of The Oregon Mist August 19, 1892.)

The government steamer Lincoln was busy the latter part of last week making a preliminary survey of the channel on St. Helens bar, to ascertain if any change had taken place in the channel during the spring freshet.

The number of persons of school age in the county and the apportionment of money for the year 1892 were 1885 and \$2793.25, respectively.

E. H. Flagg of Salem put in an appearance Saturday, returning Monday with Mrs. Flagg who had been visiting her parents for some time. Mrs. Flagg expects to return here again soon.

Mrs. Anderson, 45 years old was lost in the hills of South Seapooose creek from Saturday afternoon until Sunday evening last week. When found she was in good health and as the worse to a her thrilling experience.

ORDINANCE NO. 253.

An Ordinance providing for the grading and paving of the east half of the street, sometimes designated as Strand street in the City of St. Helens, Oregon, in front of the southerly 26 feet of lot 18 and in front of lots 19, 20 and 21 in Block Eleven of said City, letting the contract therefor and providing for the payment thereof out of the General Fund of said City, and declaring an emergency.

Whereas, the City of St. Helens, Oregon, is the owner of all that portion of the Strand in the City of St. Helens in Columbia County, Oregon, fronting upon lots 19, 20 and 21 and the southerly 26 feet of lots 18 all in block Eleven;

And Whereas, a street 50 feet wide has been deeded and dedicated to said City over and along said Strand from the northerly boundary of Cowitz street to the Court House in said City, and the property owners on either side of said street are all desirous of grading and paving said street between said points;

And Whereas, all of such owners except said City have arranged to pave and have entered into a contract with the Warren Construction Company for the paving of all of that part of said street lying in front of and adjacent to the property of each of said owners; and the Common Council of said City deeming it expedient that the same be paved, including the City's said portion thereof, to-wit: The easterly one half of said street lying in front of lots 19, 20 and 21 and in front of the southerly 26 feet of lot 18 all in block Eleven of said City, and the costs thereof be paid out of the general fund of said City;

And Whereas, said Common Council is in receipt of plans, specifications, and estimates of the probable cost of such improvement including the cost of its particular portion of such improvement, which estimated cost of said City's particular portion is the sum of \$1471.59; and the Common Council having examined said plans, specifications and estimates, and having found the same to be satisfactory in all particulars;

Now, Therefore, the City of St. Helens does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the Common Council of the City of St. Helens, Oregon, is hereby authorized and empowered to enter into a contract for the grading and paving of that portion of the easterly one half of Strand street, or that street located along the Strand in said City, which lies in front of lots 19, 20 and 21 and in front of the southerly 26 feet of lot 18, all in block Eleven of said City; and said Common Council is further empowered and authorized to advertise bids for the execution of said improvement.

Section 2. That upon the completion of said grading and paving according to said plans and specifications, the Common Council of said City shall immediately, or soon thereafter, as it shall be satisfied that all claims for labor and material used in the execution and completion of said improvement have been paid draw a warrant or warrants upon the general fund of said City for the amount due to the Contractor performing said work.

Section 3. Inasmuch as the other property owners interested in said improvement have entered into a contract with the Warren Construction Company for the construction of their portion of said improvement and it is expedient that the City's portion thereof be paid at the same time, not only making a better job at a much reduced cost, but also obviating palpable dangers arising from the unfinished condition of any portion of said proposed improvement, thus endangering the public peace health and safety of the City and the people thereof, it is therefore declared and Ordained that an emergency exists and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the Mayor of said City.

Read the first time August 16, 1920.

Read the second time August 16, 1920.

Read the third time and passed the 16th day of August 1920.

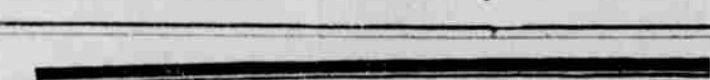

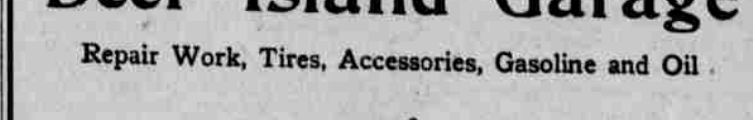
