

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

St. Helens, Ore., August 2, 1920.
The City Council met in regular session on the above date.
Present: Magnus Saxon, mayor; Robert Dixon, James O'Connor, C. L. Wheeler, councilmen; J. B. Godfrey, deputy recorder; George Potter, marshal; J. W. Day, attorney.
Minutes of the last regular session were read and after one graph had been stricken out and minor corrections, were approved.
An order was ordered to cancel warrant No. 2404 for \$2147.20 in favor of Warren Construction Company and issue a warrant in their favor for \$1933.95.
The question of improvement on the street, south of the Court street, was discussed.
Mr. Day made some remarks

in regard to same; also Mr. Gore spoke on the subject and stated that the property owners had signed up for the improvements. Mr. Day was ordered to draw up an ordinance covering same and the city's part of improvement was to be paid out of general fund. Columbia county is to deed city part of Strand street. Motion by Larabee, seconded by O'Connor that the city accept the offer of the county to deed city a part of the Strand, carried. Street committee was to inquire into the matter.
Motion made and carried to lay the petition of C. A. Tucker, et al, for sidewalk across St. Helens street and in front of lots 1, 2 and 3, block 56, over until next meeting.
Mrs. Weigle made a complaint in regard to the sewer and houseboats in front of her property.
Mr. Reed made some remarks in regard to a carnival to be held in St. Helens on the Strand this week. Motion made and carried that band be given the concession for the carnival.

Motion by Dixon, seconded by Wheeler, that the resolution for the improvement of Winter street from center line of Willamette 455 feet north be adopted and published after 30 days. Carried.
Motion made and carried that the recorder request Mr. Aklin to render city an account in regard to the city dock.

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Oregon Cow Sets New Record

A new high-water mark in production by testing association cows in Oregon has been set by "Pennie," a grade Jersey in the dairy herd of L. A. McCormack of Tillamook. Pennie gave 1896 pounds of milk, 115.65 pounds of fat, in the month of June. About \$70 worth of fat alone in a single month. D. A. Wilbur, tester for the Tillamook association, reports an average yield of 40 pounds of fat. E. B. Fitts, in charge of association testing for O. A. C. reports 166 honor cows in all associations for June.

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
