He purchased stumps of the article and has the stumps out of 2 1/2 acres and, it is said that the piece of ground was quite "too." He has probably done days' time to the undertaking at ordinary wages, cost \$20, making the total cost of the land less than \$40 for acre. This price is considered very cheap, especially as the land is thoroughly cleared of stumps and is ready for the plow.

County School News

The annual institute for teachers of Columbia county will be held October 20, 21 and 22.

Teachers have been secured for practically all of the schools for the coming year. A very large per cent of them have never taught in this county. New men will head the Scappoose, St. Helens and Clatskanie schools.

All school districts will receive about \$275 for each teacher employed in the elementary grades of their schools as a result of the 2 per cent millage tax law. School districts having a small valuation will be the real beneficiaries of this law.

District No. 26, Alder Grove, is making some needed improvements on the school building, and the Warren district will build an up-to-date play shed. Chapman will have a new school building, and Clatskanie recently voted to bond their district for \$25,000, the money to be used for the construction of a new high school building.

The Rainier school was the first to apply for space for its school exhibit at the county fair. Supt. Gauntt, who was in St. Helens Saturday for the purpose of selecting space for his school, said that considerable interest would be taken in the exhibits by his pupils this year.

District No. 49, about ten miles from Buxton and a joint district of Washington and Columbia county territory, has one of the highest flag poles in the world. The flag pole was raised a short time ago and is 232 feet high. This district has also purchased new shades and desks during the summer.

There are now 50 organized school districts in the county, and there were enrolled 3362 pupils in all the schools during the past school year. The total receipts from all sources for the maintenance of the schools was \$246,597 and total disbursements \$219,459.

Clarke's Club Demonstrates

Mrs. H. C. Klein Smith of Clackamas county, one of the well-known poultry fanciers of the county, was in Oregon City recently, accompanied by the Clarke's Poultry club, consisting of Lester Gard, 11; Raphael Gard, 13; Harvey Nelson, 15; Merle Cummings, 12; Leonard Marshall, 12.

The boys gave a demonstration of culling eight birds they had brought from the farms of Clarke to be used in their demonstration work, and also showed the proper manner in which eggs should be packed for shipping. The demonstration attracted much attention and was given during the morning session, and under the direction of Miss Snedeker of Oregon City.

The Clarke's Poultry club was organized in April, and through the efforts of Mrs. Klein Smith, the young people have gained much information regarding the poultry industry. She is in charge of the club at Clackamas, and is one of the best posted women in the county on poultry industry.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

St. Helens, Oregon, Aug. 16, 1920.

The city council met on the above date in regular session. Present: Magnus Saxon, mayor; Robert Dixon, James O'Connor, C. L. Wheeler, and N. O. Larabee, councilmen; E. E. Quick, city recorder; George Potter, city marshal; and J. W. Day, city attorney.

The minutes of the last regular and special meetings were read and approved.

Report: The marshal reported that no building to be had by the city in West St. Helens for the housing of fire hose, also reported that L. Rosasco offered to sell the city a small house for \$5.00 and place it at the dump for a tool house. It was decided to accept Rosasco's offer and that the marshal be instructed to attend to the matter.

A motion was made and seconded that the proposition offered Mr. Larabee for housing the fire hose at West St. Helens be placed in a proper place so as to be accessible to the public. Motion carried.

City Attorney Day made a report on the jitney license ordinance and moving picture shows.

An application was received from N. O. Larabee to repair dwelling in West St. Helens. Permit ordered issued.

In the matter of the petition of A. C. Tucker and others for a sidewalk in front of lots 1, 2 and 3, block 27, this matter was discussed and a motion made and seconded that the city attorney be instructed to draw up an ordinance with the petition. Motion lost. A motion was then made and seconded that the petition be returned with the request that the petitioners build their own sidewalk in front of their own property. Motion carried.

In the matter of the resolution and notice to property owners for the improvement of Wyeth street in the city: This matter coming on to be heard on published notice to property owners on said street and for the hearing of objections to said improvement and it appearing that J. B. Godfrey, one of the property owners affected by said improvement, had filed his objections to said improvement in writing as to lots 10, 11, 12 and 13 in block 16, being assessed for said improvement and the council after discussion of the matter entertained a motion which was made and seconded, that a new resolution be made and published eliminating said lots in said block from the boundaries of the street district. Motion carried.

A deed was received from Columbia county, for Strand, to the city for paying purposes.

An ordinance was introduced and read for paying the Strand the first time in full, and on motion made and carried was read the second time by title only, and on motion made and carried was read the third time in full and put on its final passage, said ordinance containing an emergency clause, and was passed by the following vote: Dixon, yes; O'Connor, yes; Wheeler, yes; Larabee, yes; was signed and approved by the mayor and attested by the recorder.

A motion was made and carried that the recorder notify the creamery association that they would be expected to pay for the paving in front of the property leased by them from the city.
