WORD TO THE WISE

Listen! October is on the wire. Take down the receiver and hear her call. "Last month to live out-doors," she tells you. "Come out into the freshness; lay by a store of vigor against shut-in weather: fill your lungs with oxygen 'till you tingle to your toes. Look up into my calm skies; wonder at the bird caravans wending their unguided way southward; hearken to the soft rustle of my dry leaves; startle when a nut drops or a squirrel breaks a twig; gasp at the great splashes of color I paint across the woodland; and think, think, think—my quiet is thought-provoking. Get your bearings in the universe before the hurly-burly and while of winter set in."

GREEN TOMATOES

There was a time when we considered the tomatoes which did not ripen a total loss. Now we have learned to make these into delicious and rich food. If they are picked and laid carefully in a dry place in the cellar they will ripen slowly and one may serve ripe, raw tomatoes until nearly Christmas.

They may be preserved in dry salt or in a brine made from one gallon water, three-fourths cup vinegar and two small cups salt. When desired, they must be soaked to freshen.

Fried Green Tomatoes, or the "Poor Man's Beefsteak."

Slice and soak in salt water one hour, dip in beaten egg, then in flour slowly in half butter and half lard. Make a milk gravy after the tomatoes are removed from the fry-pan and put some gravy on each slice, saving a part to eat with potatoes.

Baked Potatoes.

Prepare as above but instead of frying put in a greased pan, add enough boiling water to almost cover and bake slowly forty-five minutes, or until tender.

Baked Tomatoes, Stuffed.

Soak tomatoes in salt water, remove top, take out seeds, fill cavity with mixture of boiled hominy grits, barley, or rice well seasoned with onion, paprika and ground peanuts. Bake as above.

In Relishes.

Green tomatoes may be used in all sorts of pickles, chili-sauce, chowchow, in conserves, and in salads and sandwiches in all the ways olives are used.

Green Tomato Stew.

Sear a sliced onion, then add one cup of raw meat chopper and sear this. Add two carrots, one pimento, and six large green tomatoes (soaked) all of which vegetables have been chopped. Cover with boiling water and cook until tender (two hours). Thicken with flour and add butter, pepper and salt. Serve with hominy, barley or rice as chop-suey.
