CLATSKANIE—Leader: J. N. Miller. Goal—1 drainage tile demonstration, on dyked land; 2 superphosphate demonstrations; 2 potash demonstrations; make acidity tests; pool tile and lime orders.
GOBLE (Beaver Homes)—Leader: Jack Anliker. Goal—Get four men to grow green manure crops; 2 superphosphate demonstrations; make acidity tests and pool lime orders.
MARSHLAND—Leader: Walter B. Colvin. Goal—1 drainage demonstration on tulle land; make acidity tests, and pool lime orders; 3 superphosphate demonstrations; two men to grow green manure crops.
MAYGER—Leader: Wm. Roberts. Goal—Two superphosphate demonstrations; make acidity tests and pool lime orders.
RAINIER—Leader: Wm. Holden. Goal—Two drainage demonstrations, get six men to grow green manure crops; four demonstrations of superphosphate; pool community orders on tile and lime.
WARREN—Leader: Lou Snyder. Goal—Two drainage demonstrations; two superphosphate demonstrations; two men to grow green manure crops; pool tile and lime orders.

CLATSKANIE—Leaders: E. C. Gorman, P. E. Burke. Goal—Twenty acres strawberries; twenty acres sugarberries; three sunflower and corn trials; specialists on one variety of potato and grade pack; four to hill-select potato seed.
GOBLE (Beaver Homes)—Leader: Carl Bardell. Goal—Five acres berries; three corn variety trials and sunflowers; get six men to hill-select and grade potatoes.
MARSHLAND—Leader: Mark Elliott. Goal—Three sunflower demonstrations; one demonstration of peas and barley; one lemon-trait potato; lecture on selection of potato seed; specialize on one variety of potato and grade pack; market under label with Clatskanie growers; three to hill-select potato seed.
MAYGER—Leader: John Pelto. Goal—One sunflower demonstration; three to hill-select potatoes; select one variety of potato and grade and pack with Rainier.
RAINIER—Leader: John Hale. Goal—Ten acres strawberries; fifteen acres loganberries; adopt one variety of potato for entire community; six more to hill-select potato seed.
WARREN—Leader: P. H. Lano. Goal—Four demonstrations corn against sunflowers; six to hill-select potatoes; specialize on one variety of potato and grade pack; treat spuds; one mint demonstration.

What is Your Telephone Service Worth?
The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company has built up a telephone system in Oregon from 70227 stations in 1900 to 94,582 stations in 1920. This development was secured for the most part during a period when cost of labor and materials was normal. During these 20 years the Telephone Company has carried out its part in the building of Oregon. Its operating expenses have increased faster than its revenue—for the last five years it has been operating at an increasing deficit. This condition cannot permanently continue.
New capital cannot be obtained by public utilities at all except when rates are such as will afford reasonable assurance, with efficient management, of earnings sufficient to care for legitimate fixed charges and establish for them a basis of credit. This does not mean that rates should be such as in themselves will supply new capital, but that they be such as to justify capital investments in competition with other business ventures.
The proposed rates represent a very small increase to the individual user—FROM 2 1/2 TO 11 CENTS PER DAY. In the aggregate they represent a revenue to the Telephone Company sufficient to enable it to continue to serve the public, meet its payroll obligations and show a reasonable return upon a legitimate investment.
Adequate service is dependent upon adequate rates.
