FARMERS' WEEK HELD AT RAINIER

The 11th annual Farmers' Week to be held in Columbia county was an unqualified success. Starting Tuesday morning, January 11th, the entire week was devoted to lectures and demonstrations on various subjects of immediate interest to the farmers of Columbia County. In carrying out the program of the week the lines of work selected by the farmers of the county for their Farm Bureau program were followed very closely. This confined the topics discussed to projects selected by the farmers as the ones they thought needed special attention in this county.

Tuesday was Horticultural Day. Berries and small fruit came in for a full discussion. Wednesday was Dairy Day. Prof. E. B. Pitta, L. J. Allen, M. S. Schroek, and K. V. Goss contributed to a full and complete program. Thursday was devoted to Soils and Crops, and Friday to poultry. One of the most thorough appreciated lectures of the entire week was that on "The Maintenance of Soil Fertility," given Thursday afternoon by Prof. Powers of the O. A. C. department of soil fertility. So well was he pointed on the soil types of the county that one might easily believe he had made a survey and study of the whole county.

In advertising the week, special emphasis was laid on the importance of having a full attendance. A large crowd of interested men and women were on hand that morning to help in the work that was to start the completion of the Farm Bureau Organization on the platform for the morning session. He outlined the methods of the organization and the work of the Farm Bureau of other districts. Two committees were selected to select a constitution and by-laws, and submit nominations for the officers of the new organization.

Early in the afternoon Geo. A. Mansfield, president of the State Federation of Farm Bureaus, addressing the crowd that filled the auditorium of the Rainier High School, gave one of the most stirring and convincing talks ever heard in this county. He had at his command the facts and figures on our present agricultural situation and presented them in such a way that none but the blind could help seeing. Following his talk a Standard Farm Bureau constitution and by-laws was adopted and the membership fee was placed at \$10, following out the policy of the organization that it shall be well financed and pay its way as it goes. The farmers voted to hire the National Farm Bureau organizers to come into the county to perfect the organization, and a guarantee fund of \$1000 was raised at the meeting for this purpose. This action will insure Columbia county becoming one of the best Farm Bureau counties in the state.

The nominating committee made the following nominations for officers and their nominees were voted in by the assembly: F. B. Holbrook, president; R. H. Dibblee, vice president; Theodore Heath, secretary-treasurer. The following were selected as executive committee and leaders of the county projects included in the Farm Bureau program: Poultry, R. Robinson; Dairy and Livestock, Jack Widows; Soil Improvement, R. N. Miller; Crop Improvement, John Hale; Boys' and Girls' Clubs, Than Brown.

The Rainier Chamber of Commerce and the school authorities gave the farmers hearty cooperation and excellent support. The assistance in advertising the week and on Saturday evening served a fine dinner followed by an evening of entertainment. Mr. Mansfield in an after-dinner speech discussed the relation of the Farm Bureau movement to the commercial interests and consumers of farm products.

The Farm Bureau feels fortunate in securing the officers that were elected. Their well known business ability and "push" is counted on to make the organization a success in its avowed purpose of putting the agriculture on a business basis.
