

REPUBLICANS FOR BONUS TO VETERANS OF WAR

House Members Intend to Again Go to Bat for Defenders of Country Who Gave Up All.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 20.—That the bill providing a bonus for the soldiers and sailors of the United States who served in the World War will be reintroduced immediately and be rushed to final passage is the expectation of Republican leaders.

This bill proposes to meet the national obligation to these veterans by providing them for their choice presenting four separate and distinct plans of remuneration. Briefly stated, these plans are:

1. Adjusted service pay, or \$1 per day for each day's home service and \$1.25 for each day's overseas service during the war in excess of 60 days, the military or naval forces of the United States between April 5, 1917, and July 1, 1919, said sum, or more than \$500, to be paid in 10 equal quarterly installments, and if less than \$500 in quarterly installments of \$50, conditioned that the same-service pay shall not exceed \$50 and the overseas service pay shall not exceed \$625 to any one person.
2. Adjusted service certificate plan, which increases the adjusted service pay 40 per cent, allows 4 1/2 per cent per annum, compound interest, for 20 years, the whole amount payable upon the death of the recipient as insurance, and against which the applicant may borrow 50 per cent of the total amount due, including interest from the third to the fifth year, inclusive, and 80 per cent due at any time between the fifth and twentieth years.
3. Vocational-training aid, which provides for the payment of \$1.75 per day for each day's service by the veteran in a course of vocational training, the total payment not to exceed 140 per cent of adjusted service pay.
4. Farm or home aid, the amount expended by the government for such assistance to be 40 per cent higher than the adjusted service pay.

Conceding the justice of this proposal, the duty to meet it, if it can be met without injustice to the public, conclusively follows.

What will it cost and how will that cost be distributed throughout the ensuing years under the terms of the bill?

It is not difficult to arrive at the minimum cost, the amount that would be paid by the government if everyone in the military and naval service entitled to it should avail himself of the provisions of the adjusted service pay plan generally described as the cash plan, and the maximum cost, if every one entitled thereto should apply for the adjusted service certificate generally referred to as the certificate plan.

NO WORK, GOING BACK TO LAND

Widespread unemployment in the cities has created a drift back to the farm and relieved the farm labor shortage brought about during the war, reports of federal and state employment bureaus reveal.

Farm hands in the great grain belt of the central states are reported plentiful at wages greatly reduced as compared with a year ago.

Farmers, who for several years have been forced to grant almost any concessions to labor to bring their crops through, are in a position this year to dictate terms of employment, according to employment agency officials. Then too, the farmer faces the problem this year of holding down the cost of production because of the low prices of farm products and generally is trying to get along with as little help as possible.

Farm wages in Kansas this year average \$40 a month, board and lodging, or about \$20 less than a year ago, the free employment bureau in that state reports. W. H. Lewis, Missouri labor commissioner, declares "there probably will not be any shortage of farm labor this year and wages probably will be much lower than in any year since 1915."

In North Dakota a survey disclosed that farm labor for spring and summer work was plentiful at from \$19 to \$40 a month as compared with wages of from \$50 to \$60 a month paid last year.

In Illinois the state department of labor reports farm hands going back to the farms and accepting the cut in wages.

Kansas farmers are demanding experienced men after worrying along for several years with any sort of

labor that presented itself, according to officials of the Kansas Free Employment Bureau. Experienced applicants are being located as fast as they apply, however, while there are about sixteen applicants for every job open in other lines of industry, the records show.

The bureau warns that farm hands who venture to define how many hours a day they are willing to work stand a poor chance of getting jobs.

The general scale recognized in Kansas the principal growing state according to bureau officials, runs: For experienced hands from \$25 to \$50 a month (according to experience) for single men, and from \$40 to \$65 for married men who are willing to live on farms with their families. Last year, the peak year of farm wages, the scale ran \$40 to \$65 for single men and \$50 to \$80 for married men.

The immediate prospect is that harvest wages this year will be around \$5 a day as compared with \$7 last year, the Kansas bureau reports.

EXPERT SENT TO AID SALEM FRUIT GROWERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 21.—R. R. Pailthorp, connected with the department of agriculture as an expert in the harvesting and handling of fruits for shipment, has been detailed from Spokane to conduct experimental work at Salem in connection with the Oregon Co-operative Fruit Growers' association, the department advised Senator McNary, as he was responsible for increasing the appropriation for this purpose \$10,000 in the last agricultural appropriation bill getting \$30,000 all told.

The Oregon growers want the help of the department expert in packing and marketing years and other fruits and also his advice about hardy cauliflower and other vegetables shipped East, which need some change in the method of shipping and packing.

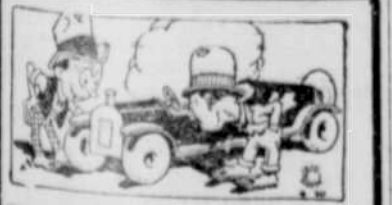
