

## OREGON TAXES SHOW A LARGE INCREASE

Past Ten Years Have Increased 170 per cent. Total Tax is Approximately \$41,000,000.

SALEM, Ore.—Taxes in Oregon have increased about 170 per cent in the last ten years, according to records in the offices of the state tax commission.

The levy of 1911 on the rolls of

the year amounted to \$15,210,000.15.

The levy of this year is \$41,117,367.71.

The difference is \$25,907,327.71,

which is somewhere near 170 per

cent.

School taxes alone, which are the state's biggest item of expense, ex-

ceeded by approximately 20 per cent

in the general tax expense of the state a few years ago. Oregon taxpayers are

now paying a total of \$16,290,

for maintenance of education-

administrations and general education-

purposes. This is an excess over

the entire tax expense of the state

a few years ago.

Another interesting comparison is

the comparison of the present school

and road taxes, not counting the au-

thorized income tax, compared with

the most levy in the state for all

the years ten years ago. The road

taxes, not counting automobile in-

come, is approximately \$16,989,

which is equal to the \$16,290,000

income tax. The result is \$26,349,

an excess of \$10,150,610.64

over the entire tax of 1911, or about

16 per cent excess.

The school taxes voted by the

people, \$2,000,000; general school

### OPEN CALYX REQUIRED IN COOLING MOTH SPRAY

This Application Essential to Con-  
trol of Apple Worm—Lead  
Arsenate Standard.

The cooling moth spray known as  
the calyx spray should be applied as  
soon as the majority of the petals  
have fallen and before the calyx has  
closed, say the O. A. C. experiment  
station entomologists.

In an orchard which has a num-  
ber of varieties the grower may have  
to spray at different dates to cover  
the trees at the proper stage. With  
the Waxcenter and similar trees on  
which blossoms are born terminally  
it may be necessary to make two ap-  
plications to get the blossoms at the  
proper time.

This spray is very essential to the  
control of the apple worm and should  
not be omitted. The spray recom-  
mended is 2 pounds of arsenate of  
lead to 100 gallons of water. This  
is ordinarily added to a regular spray  
of lime-sulfur applied at the rate of  
2½ gallons to 100 gallons of water.

The spray should be applied with  
an angle nozzle, down into the calyx  
cup.
