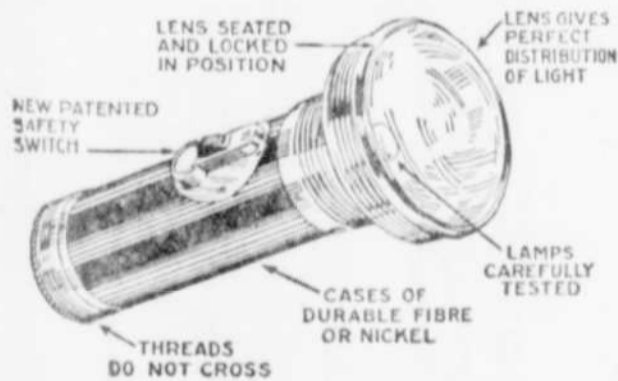
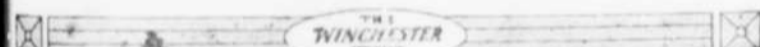

10,000 Crippled in Poland.

Poland's contribution to crippled manhood as a result of the late war is 10,000 men, according to official figures gathered by the American Red Cross. Every one of these has lost either an arm or leg. Only 500 of this number have been equipped with artificial limbs and the remainder are waiting for the promised establishment of schools where they can learn a trade and become useful members of society. In one hospital at Posen there is a factory for the manufacture of artificial limbs, but a shortage of materials obstructs the work.

Swedish Red Cross Work.

Three thousand three hundred and ninety-four children were received into private homes in Sweden during the three months of the summer of 1919 under the auspices of the Swedish Red Cross. These children were clothed, fed and sent to school by the people in whose homes they lived and were sent home happy. The same work was carried on in 1921 when 4400 children were cared for. The Swedish Red Cross worked in cooperation with societies of other countries and arrangements were made whereby transportation charges for the children were paid by the societies of their native lands.

"New Faces" Will Be Provided.

"New faces" will be provided for more wounded French soldiers by a decision of the American Red Cross to devote the balance of an unexpended fund to that purpose. The money has been allotted to the Paris "Studio of Portrait Masks," which was founded by the Red Cross during the war and had since provided a set of new features to many French soldiers suffering from ghastly facial wounds. The masks are made from thin copper, enamelled and colored to counterfeit the soldier's facial expression.

"Lefts" Wear Out First.

Investigation followed the discovery of St. Louis shoe repair shops that more left shoes than rights were being tendered for repair. Steam heat pipes in streetcars were found responsible. Passengers toasted their toes and scorched their soles.
