## PLANS COMPLETE FOR CELEBRATION

Vernonia Completes Plans for Big  
Three-Day Celebration—St. Helens  
Furnishes Band and Many Will Go  
From Here.

No matter what the weather man does, he cannot dampen the ardor of the citizens of Vernonias and nearby communities who have made up their minds to have a grand and glorious celebration in the coming city of the Nehalem valley, and the people of St. Helens have entered into the spirit of the Nehalem metropolis and will do their utmost to aid in the success of the celebration.

A committee, of which Judge Martin White was chairman, called on the business men of St. Helena Monday afternoon. The purpose of the committee was to raise \$250 to pay for the 20-piece band which St. Helena agreed to furnish. They met with a hearty response. The band was organized by Raymond W. Jones who is the leader, and who returned Thursday from the encampment of the Oregon national guard at Camp Lewis. There will be twenty musicians in the band, all Columbia county boys.

But the band is only a small feature of the big program which starts on Saturday, July 2. There will be races, sports, fire works, patriotic exercises, picnics, baseball games and every other sort of clean amusements.

HARRY M. STINE  
DIES AT MONMOUTH

Harry Moran Stine, one time University of Oregon champion athlete, died at his home in Monmouth Tuesday. He was 34 years of age, having been born June 5, 1887, in Lebanon, Or. He was the son of Jacob H. and Mary Stine. His father was a pioneer newspaper man in the Willamette valley and was accidentally killed near Whinston in 1891.

Harry Stine was graduated from the Oregon Normal in 1906 and from the state university in 1912. While at the university, with R. P. Newland, he held the championship in tennis doubles for the northwest.

His mother, Mrs. Mary Stine, survives him, as well as two half brothers, Guy Deming of LaPine, Or., and A. J. Deming of St. Helens.
