TAX COLLECTIONS DECREASE IN 1921

Receipts Total \$812,000,000 Less Than in the Fiscal Year of 1920

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Internal revenue collections during the fiscal year 1921 decreased more than \$812,000,000 as compared with 1920, while the cost of collections advanced from 55 to 55 cents for each \$100, according to a preliminary statement issued by Commissioner Blair.

Collections for 1921 totaled \$1,595,000,765 against \$5,407,550,251 in 1920 while income and profits taxes yielded \$3,225,790,852 as compared with \$3,956,939,993 in 1920, and miscellaneous taxes produced \$1,359,210,112, against \$1,450,644,248 in 1920.

FARM POINTERS

Probably the easiest way to get a stand of grass under western Oregon conditions is to burn over the land in the fall and sow a mixture of grass seed on the dry ashes as soon as they have cooled. The first rains in the fall will cover the seed and it usually makes a good stand. The recommended mixture for fairly well drained upland of either the rolling valley type or the red hills is English rye grass 6 pounds, orchard grass 3 pounds, Kentucky blue grass 3 pounds, meadow fescue 2 pounds, timothy 2 pounds, red clover 2 pounds and white clover 1 pound.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS A clean cloth dipped in hot water and then in a saucer of bran will speedily clean white paint without injury to the woodwork. The soft bran acts like soap on the dirt. Grass stains are easily removed by rubbing on enough butter to cover them and then washing the material with ordinary soap and water. This removes all traces of stain and does not alter the color of the fabric. When you have no hot water bottle and need one in an emergency wrap a flannel out of hot water and apply as needed. Fill an ordinary glass bottle with hot water and lay it against the cloth. To keep silverware bright take a piece of chamois leather, double it and stitch compartments for each piece. This is the best way to keep it if it is to be stored for any length of time. If vinegar is kept in a jug it is a good idea to filter off a bacterial for daily use, as it is annoying to find sediment "mother" in the salad dressing you have made. To make biscuits or muffins taste like new, place them in a utensil that may be covered tightly, then place said utensil over hot water until the biscuits are heated thoroughly. Do not allow steam to enter the compartment where the biscuits are or you will simply have steamed biscuits. A large double boiler is good. CLOTHING SENT TO NEEDY IN EUROPE

WASHINGTON, D. C., September 8.—A total of 46,699 pounds of clothing contributed by over 160 American communities, has already been received at Brooklyn, N. Y., ready for shipment in response to the joint appeal of the American Red Cross and the American Friends Service Committee in behalf of the desperately needy of Europe. The bulk of the clothing, according to the first report received at the Red Cross National Headquarters, is for children, whose situation is particularly pitiful. Shipments of children's clothing total nearly twenty tons and in addition Red Cross chapter workers have already made and shipped more than two tons of jackets.

The response to the appeal has come from communities large and small throughout the country. Houghkeepsie, N. Y., sent 2,600 pounds of clothing and shoes. Los Angeles made an initial contribution of 3,400 pounds. Newton, Mass., Utica, N. Y., Chicago, Philadelphia and Boston each made substantial contributions. But it is a large aggregate of small communities that swelled the total.
