## LOCATED AFTER 10-YEAR SEARCH

Man Who Disappeared from Colorado Accidentally Discovered in Salem

SALEM, Oregon.—"Hello Dad," A. G. Cook, of Durango, Col., who was being shown through the state hospital for the insane recently, started as he heard the voice. At the same moment he heard his daughter, who accompanied him say in a startled voice—

"Why, there is Walter."

In one of the wards Cook recognized Walter Patty, his son in law, who disappeared from his home in Colorado over 10 years ago and who has since been sought by detective agencies and newspaper advertisements all over the west.

For less than 10 minutes Mr. Cook was allowed to ask the questions that would clear the mystery of nearly a dozen years before. Patty again yielded to the hallucination with which he is afflicted and the door to the history of those years was closed.

Patty is 40 years old.

Ten years ago Patty, a wealthy rancher, who had married Cook's oldest daughter, was seized by deep periods of melancholy during which he often threatened to leave home. He was put under medical care and was thought to have completely recovered when he disappeared, leaving no clue as to where he had gone. For over five years his wife and father conducted a thorough search over the west, advertising in the big western newspapers and employing several detective agencies. After a long and fruitless search the task was given up and Mrs. Patty was married again and settled on the ranch left by her first husband.

With no thought of searching for

their son in law Mr. and Mrs. Cook started with their son and another daughter on an auto tour of the coast. Arriving in this city they were attracted by the gardens surrounding the state hospital and out of curiosity obtained permission to go through the buildings.

Doctors hold no hope for Patty's recovery. The Cooks have left for California after writing Patty's relatives of their finding him here.

Patty was committed from Benton county in January of this year. So far it has been impossible to learn of his history during the 10 years of his wandering.

## READY FOR PENDLETON ROUND-UP

PENDLETON, Sept. 8.—Pendleton is ready once more to stage that great outdoor drama the Round-up September 22, 23 and 24. The atmosphere of the "biggest little city in the world" is permeated with Round-up spirit. Dignified citizens have donned the broad brimmed hat of the cowboy and these, with the brilliant shirts, long haired chaps and riding boots worn by horsemen, give a festive air to the "Let 'er Buck" city.

Each year the show eclipses that of the year before and there is no doubt that the 1921 presentation will break all records. A galaxy of star performers, including the famous Charles Irwin family of 20 cowboys and cowgirls, as well as individual performers, among them Yak and Kity Cautt, Frank McCarroll, Prairie Rose and Johnny Budd will be here. Tom Mix, daredevil cowboy screen hero, and his company will compete in events of track and arena. Snappy steers, fast relay strings and hot tempered buckers are ready for the three big days.

Thirty-five of the Round Up's own string of horses are here and with the try-outs next week, some real sparks will fly.

Excellent accommodations are promised. The show is purely a community affair and as such Pendleton homes are thrown open to the thousands of visitors. The Round-up association limits the price to \$2.50 for double beds and also regulates the price of meals, no profiting being tolerated.

Scores of orders for seats have already been received and with the opening of the seat sale September 7, the Round-up association will begin its work of meeting the great demand from all over the Northwest. The Journal Special will bring 300 visitors from Portland for the last two days while a special train from Tacoma will bring 125 business men here for Thursday, "Tacoma Day" when "Let 'er Buck" and "Watch Tacoma Grow" will be synchronous.

Among the well known persons who will see the show will be Pauline Frederick, Bebe Daniels and Tom Mix, screen favorites; W. V. Woelke, editor of Sunset Magazine; Verne H. Porter, managing editor of the Commercial; W. C. Kenney, vice president of the Great Northern; Carl Gray, president of the Union Pacific, and Governor Ben W. Olcott.

FORDSON TRACTOR IS APPROVED

## WEATHER REPORT FOR AUGUST, 1921
