FLAGG WRITES OF PIONEER LAYS

On Labor Day the steamer Madeline, of the Harkins fleet steamed into Warrenton, and the sight of her gave E. H. Flagg, former editor of the Mist and well known throughout Columbia county a recognition of early days which he thus expressed:

"Do you remember?" forty years ago, when the steamer Joseph Kelllogg with the whiteheaded master at the wheel, made regular trips, alternating on each side of Sauvie's Island between Portland and St. Helens and other points, shoving out the gang planks everywhere there was a passenger or an unsightly dent in milk can, and giving a dinner for 25 cents that could not be equalled today for a "big simoleon?" We thought she was numbered among the phantoms of the river, and that all that was left of her was in the memory of the Bonsers, the Luckles, the Fullertons, Perrys, Watsons and the other old fellows who laid the foundation for our wonderful development. But we saw her reincarnation Sunday morning when, under the name of the Madeline, she shoved her nose into the bank alongside the county bunkers and put ashore an excursion party of 120 live ones from the big metropolis, on their way to Seaside to take part in the Labor Day celebration. It was the Hikers Club of Portland with Mrs. Leslie as chaperone, Miss Span as leader, and Captain Hale of the Oregon National Guard in command.

RECIPES

Stuffed Celery

Select choice stalks of celery and fill with mixture of grated yellow cream cheese, chopped nuts and a bit of pimento.

Vegetable Cream Soups

Press a good cooked vegetable through sieve, and to one tablespoon pulp add half cup of the liquid in which the vegetable was cooked, half cup milk and a few grains of salt. Thicken with a little butter. Cook stirring constantly, until flour is well done.

Lettuce With Bacon

Wash and shred crisp lettuce. Fry bits of bacon or ham until brown and dry. Drain well, make a good boiled dressing and pour over lettuce and add the browned bacon; serve hot. If one cares for onion, a small one chopped fine may be added along with the usual seasonings.

Lunch From Left-Overs

One egg, four tablespoons of potatoes mashed; beat egg and potatoes together; take left-over little pic sausages, make a case of the potato around each sausage and bake brown.

Peel and core an apple, make case of sweetened and spiced bread crumbs moistened with milk, bake with one-half teaspoon butter on top of each apple. Eat with cream or milk.

Escalloped Ham

Cover the bottom of the baking dish with cracker crumbs; have ready one pound of cooked ham, chopped, and six hard-boiled eggs, chopped fine; add a layer of ham, then a layer of eggs, then cracker crumbs until the dish is nearly full, cover with a white sauce, using one pint of milk, two tablespoons of butter, two tablespoons of flour and one teaspoon of salt for the sauce. Melt butter, add flour and salt; cook one minute, add milk gradually, stirring constantly until thickened.

Salmon Croquettes

One can salmon, drain, remove skin and bones and mash. Add one-beaten egg, two tablespoons melted butter, one-fourth cup milk, one cup bread crumbs, paprika, half teaspoon salt, dash of nutmeg. Form in balls the size and shape of a small egg and crumb and fry in deep fat. Salmon chops are fine, made the same as above, shape like chops, put in a piece of macaroni at the end of each, egg and crumb and fry in deep fat. Escalloped salmon is fine for supper also.

Lemon Cream Pie

Mix together one scant half cup of sugar and two tablespoons of sifted flour, pour on this slowly one pint of boiling milk, stirring well; let come to boil, stirring until slightly thickened; then add a lump of butter and beaten yolks of two eggs, pouring the thickened milk on the egg slowly at first; bring all to a boil; when cool fill your baked pie crusts, after adding one spoon of lemon extract to the cool filling; cover the pie with a meringue made of sugar and a few drops of lemon extract; brown in oven.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

When cutting in the flour and lard for pie or biscuits, use a wire potato masher. It does it so quickly, and no matter how hard the lard is, it will soon make it blend nicely with the flour.

To remove coffee, tea and chocolate stains from table linen, first sprinkle borax over them and soak in cold water and then stretch the line over a bowl or similar receptacle and pour boiling water from height directly upon the stained places.
