## STOCK JUDGING

CREATES INTEREST

Fifteen Oregon counties will send boys' and girls' club stock judging teams to the state fair. More interest has been shown this year by the young people than ever before, according to L. J. Allen, state leader of livestock clubs. Keen competition in the judging is expected at the fair.

Each county may enter one team of three members, all members coming from standard livestock clubs.

The state fair board has appropriated \$300 for the contest. The Portland Union Stock Yards will give an Oregon Agricultural college scholarship for the team scoring highest—the scholarship valued at \$75. The second prize will be \$25, the third \$20, the fourth \$15 and the fifth
