### WEEKLY LUMBER REVIEW

Featuring last week's Pacific northwest trade was the continued heavy increase in the movement of lumber by water.

Forty-two per cent of the new business reported by 105 mills was placed for cargo delivery.

This amounted to 32,014,223 feet out of a total of 76,444,223 feet represented in new orders.

Production at 68,414,562 feet was 14 per cent below normal for the mills in operation which participated in the week's summary of business.

Shipments totaled 68,465,136 feet equalling production.

In the trade for rail delivery, new orders totaled 1,481 cars, and deliveries 1,660 cars, with a balance of unshipped orders 3,613 cars. Rail shipments exceeded orders for rail delivery by 5,370,000 feet.

In the cargo trade the domestic new business totaled 29,583,223 feet while the new export orders totaled 11,431,000 feet.

Cargo shipments, coastwise and inter-coastal, totaled 13,147,748 feet; and over-seas 5,517,388 feet.

The unshipped balance of the cargo trade shows 83,213,459 feet for coastwise and inter-coastal delivery, and 66,706,589 feet for over-seas delivery.

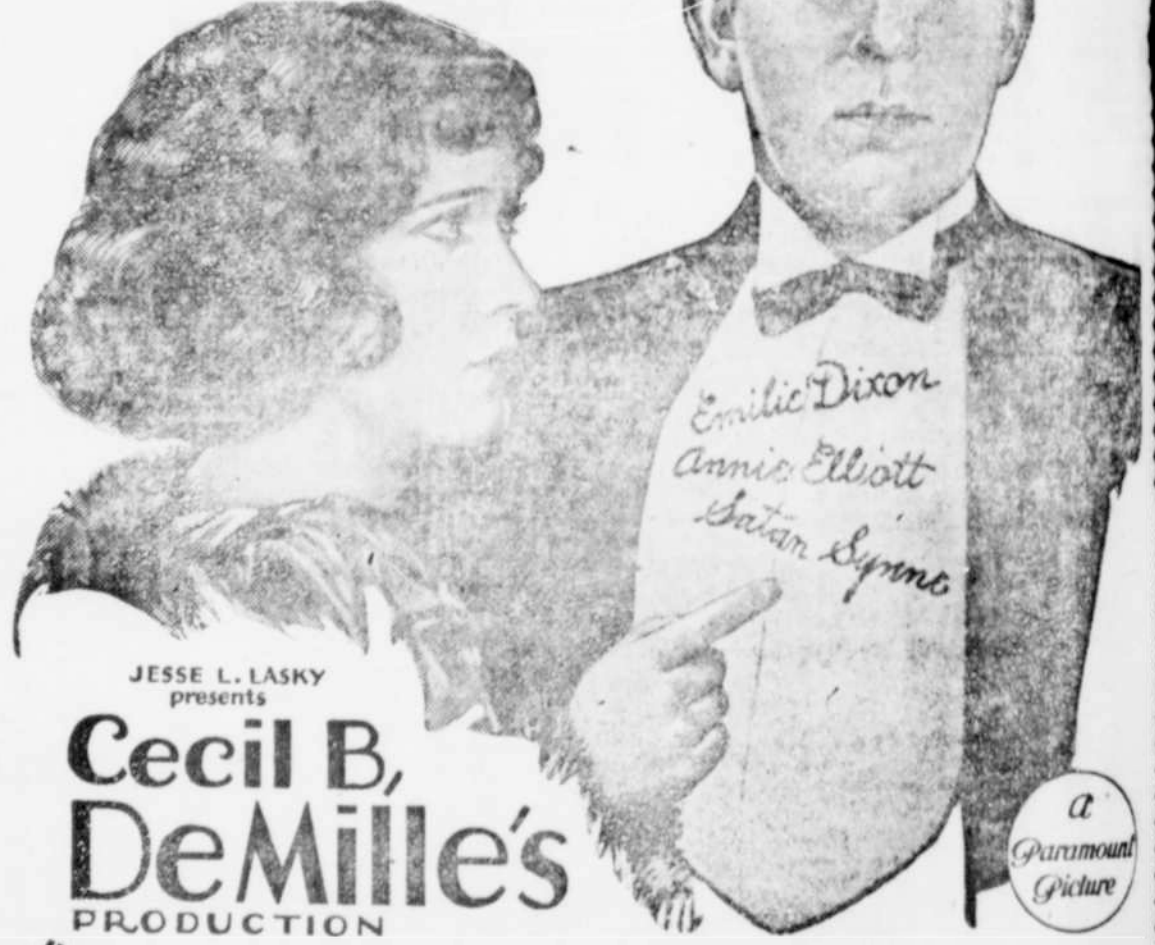
Last night there was held at Methodist church a meeting of members of the church and interested in church work for purpose of deciding upon the year's program of church activity and also the advisability making repairs to the church.
