## NEWS BRIEFS.

While searching for kindling to warm the church for his grandfather's funeral to be held the next day, Filmore James unearthed a still in the basement of the Utica Baptist church of Utica, Ind. There was no evidence of any moonshine activities under the church.

Mike Algero of New Orleans, La., won the oyster shucking championship of the south Saturday by opening 4,644 bivalves in five hours and 15 minutes, winning over six other contestants. Algero used the "hammer 'n knife method."

The interstate commerce commission at Washington granted authority to the Great Northern railroad to issue and sell \$30,000,000 in 5 1/2 per cent 30-year gold bonds for the purpose of paying off existing indebtedness, and adding to the facilities on its line.

A Kattawosz report from Moscow, Russia, states that 30 Polish priests in Siberia have received notes threatening them with forcible removal and even death if they do not vacate their parishes.

Attorneys representing the Pacific Coast Coal company have announced that a settlement of the legal battle which was waged for months between Washington coal mine operators and striking miners over possession of cottages standing on the ground owned by the operators has practically been reached through a decision by the operators to purchase the cottages.

Thirty-one states of the union have students enrolled at the University of Oregon, although a non-resident fee of \$60 a year is charged each student from outside the state. Washington, with the largest representation, has 63 students enrolled. California has 44; Idaho, 15; North Dakota, 8; Montana, 7; Minnesota, 6; and Illinois, 5. The other states with from one to three students are Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Connecticut, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Nebraska, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Texas, Utah and Wisconsin.

## BOY SCOUTS AND NATIONAL FORESTS

Forest officers are interested in the Boy Scout anniversary for the scouts are coming to be recognized by the forest rangers as allies in the fire campaign that is being waged on the national forests of the northwest. Reports received by the district forester from the twenty-two forests in Oregon and Washington show that Boy Scouts use portions of twenty of these national forests each summer for hiking or camping trips. On some forests the scouts have taken a very active part in fire prevention and fire suppression, realizing that this denotes a good woodsman.

These reports show that Boy Scouts are coming to appreciate the national forests, from the Crater forest in southern Oregon, to the far away Chugach forest in Alaska. In southern Oregon, Boy Scouts have taken hikes into the Crater forest, camping for ten days at some of the mountain lakes in the Cascades. From Grants Pass scouts take trips into the Siskiyou forest. From Lakeview the scouts have taken trips to Dog Lake on the Fremont forest. In eastern Oregon the Boy Scouts from Bend annually enjoy an outing at Lost Lake on the Deschutes forest, while the scouts from Halfway and Baker have used the Whitman forest in past seasons.

The Hood River scouts go to Lost Lake, while at Wahtum Lake, on the Oregon forest, is a permanent boy scout camp where large numbers of Portland scouts annually enjoy the swimming and other summer pleasures and where many a scout has come to know that the forest rangers will be his friends if he is careful at all times with his campfire.

From the state of Washington come reports of extensive use of the national forests by scouts each year. Scouts from Seattle and Everett annually spend some time in the Tyee, Mt. Pilchuck and Pratt Lake regions in the Snoqualmie forest. The Tacoma and Yakima scouts use the Rainier forest, the Yakima boys having a camp on Indian Creek, in the Tieton river country. In the spring of 1920, forest officers on the Rainier forest wrote a playlet especially for boy scouts, called "The Flame in the Forest" which was successfully performed by scouts several times in Tacoma and nearby towns.

Bellingham scouts have gone into the high country of the Washington forest after camping at elevations of 3,000 feet. The Wenatchee forest is usually visited each summer by the scouts from Wenatchee, Cashmere, Leavenworth, Ellensburg and Cle Elum. The scouts and the forest rangers are usually good friends and help each other. Wenatchee officers report. So interested are some Scouts and Scout Masters in the protection of the forests from fire that some field officers of the forest service have recommended that scout masters be appointed as fire guards.

On the Olympic forest in the past seasons scouts from Hoquiam, Port Angeles, Seattle and Shelton have taken annual trips into this forest region and have faithfully taken the keenest interest in fire prevention, local rangers say.

And from far off Cordova, headquarters of the Chugach national forest, report comes that Deputy Forest Supervisor McDonald is chairman of the troop committee and that Cordova scouts take annual trips into the Chugach forest, in the vicinity of Eyak Lake, where they are planning a summer camp. Many forest officers in Oregon and Washington act as scout masters of local troops.
