SETTERS OUT FOR CIRCUIT JUDGE

O. B. Setters, of Astoria, is a candidate for the office of circuit judge in this district and was in St. Helens Tuesday. In his formal statement Mr. Setters says:
In coming before the electoral of Clatsop and Columbia counties and announcing by candidacy on the republican ticket for the office of circuit judge I do so believing the 22 years experience I have had in the practice of law has amply qualified me for the position.
I was born in the state of Missouri on the fourth day of July, 1876. Immigrating with my parents to Washington in the year 1879, my younger years being spent on a farm near Spokane.
In June, 1899, I was admitted to the Bar by the supreme court of the state of Washington and practiced law in that state for fifteen years. I came to Astoria seven years ago and have practiced law in the state of Oregon ever since.

If nominated and elected, my policy shall be:
First, To uphold law and order and I pledge myself to the full enforcement of our national and state laws.
Second, I shall give my entire time and attention to the duties of the office and I will do every thing necessary to raise and maintain the judicial standing of Clatsop and Columbia counties to the high plane each are entitled. Every case will be decided promptly and I pledge myself that cases will not be taken under advisement and the docket held up for months thus retarding justice often times at considerable expense to the litigants.
Third, The method of handling jurors can be greatly improved so as to save the taxpayers many hundreds of dollars annually. I pledge myself to do this. I will advise the attorneys and discourage the bringing of petty cases in the circuit court necessitating the calling of a jury of twelve men at an expense of \$26.00 to the county and if the case should go over into the second day it would cost the taxpayers \$72.00. Such cases properly belong in the justice court.
Fourth, There will be no favoritism shown to any one, law, justice and order shall prevail at all times.
