PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE'S REPORT

Miss Etiecia R. Stroud, R. N., state public health demonstration nurse, representing the Oregon Tuberculosis Association and who has visited the St. Helens schools several times for the purpose of examining the children, has made the following report to the school directors: September 1921, examined pupils of the John Gunn school. Of the 279 pupils 217 were found to have defects. January 22, 1922. Came back for follow up work and found that 12 had those pupils with defects. 12 had moved away, 19 were absent from school, 1 had died, total of 32 pupils a balance of 135 to be interviewed. Of those found that 24 children had been treated and defects corrected and 16 others who were found when weather conditions were favorable. I examined the pupils of Melville school and was very pleased that the play shed had been repaired, floored and sideboarded.
