NOTICE OF CHANGES ELECTION PRECINCTS

The county court has made the following changes in the following precincts and in order to avoid any confusion election day, voters living in the following districts should familiarize themselves with the change and ascertain in what precinct they will vote in.

Warren Precinct.

Beginning at the S. W. corner of the precinct which is also the S. W. corner of Section 27, T. 4 N. R. 1 W., and running thence North along Section line 3 miles, thence East along Section line 1 mile; thence North along Section line 1/2 mile; thence East along Section line 1/2 mile; thence North along Section line 1/2 mile more or less to the intersection of the West boundary line of the City of St. Helens...

Yankton Precinct.

Beginning at the S. W. Corner of the precinct which is also the S. W. Corner of S. E. 1/4 of Section 8, T. 4 N. R. 3 W., and running thence North along center of Section lines 3 miles; thence East along Section line 1/2 mile; thence North along Section lines 10 miles; thence South along Section line 2 miles; thence East along Section line 1 mile; thence South along Section line 2 miles; thence West along Section line 1/2 mile; thence South along Section line 1 mile; thence South along Section line 1/2 mile; thence West along Section line 5 1/2 miles to the place of beginning.

Columbia City Precinct.

Beginning at the Southwest corner of Section 30, Township 5, N. R. 1 West of W. M. and running thence North on Township line 2 1/2 miles to the center line of Section 18, Township 5 N. R. 1 W.; thence East along center line of Sections 17 and 18 extending to an intersection with the main channel of the Columbia River; thence southerly along said main channel to the Northeast corner of the City of St. Helens; thence following the Northernly and Westernly boundary lines of said City of St. Helens to its intersection with the South boundary line of Section 3, Township 4 N. R. 1 W.; thence West to Southwest Corner of said section 3; thence North on the section line 2 miles; thence west on section line 1 mile to the place of beginning.

South St. Helens Precinct.

Beginning at the Southwest Corner of said precinct, which is also the Southwest Corner of Section 22, Township 3 N. R. 1 W.; thence North 2 miles; thence West along section line to the East bank of the Willamette Slough; thence Northernly following the East bank of the Willamette Slough to its intersection with the North boundary line of Section 34, Township 4 N. R. 1 W.; thence West along section line to the Western bank of said Willamette Slough; thence Northernly following the West bank of said Willamette Slough to its intersection with the

North boundary line of Section 21, Township 4, N. R. 1 W.; thence West along section line to the Southeast corner of Section 17, Township 4 N. R. 1 W.; thence north along section line to its intersection with the West line of the Thos. H. Smith D. L. C.; thence Northwest following the West line of the Smith D. L. C. to the South boundary line of the City of St. Helens; thence along the South boundary line of the City of St. Helens to the channel of the Columbia River; thence South along the channel of said Columbia River to a point where the east and west center line of Section 23 Township 3 N. R. 1 W. of extended west intersect said channel; thence West along said center line of section 23 to the 1/2 section corner on the West boundary of said section 23, Township 3 N. R. 1 W.; thence South 1/2 mile; thence West along section line 1 mile to place of beginning.
