MORE HOMES MAY SOON BE BUILT

Local Interest Keen in Home Making Program—Several New Houses in Prospect Contractors Say and Improvements Planned on Others.

With the weather conditions more propitious local interest is keener in the "Build with the Birds" campaign and contractors state they have received numerous inquiries as to plans and specifications for residences. Another contractor said that he was making estimates on the improvement of several residences. Enthusiastic approval of the movement as a civic and community enterprise has been expressed by representative citizens and business men who point out that it stimulates commercial and industrial activity in many lines. "It is right in line with the new idea of thrift which is being emphasized all over the country," Mayor Ballagh stated. "Thrift is now defined as a judicious expenditure of one's funds, and there is certainly no more commendable object of investment than a home. Given a home and the other necessities and luxuries for the family follow as a matter of course. "In promoting this movement the business men who deal in building materials and home furnishings are not only stimulating activity in their own lines, but are encouraging a resumption of trade in various commodities and creating a demand for

a larger volume of labor. I heartily approve of the building movement and before the summer is over I hope to see many new homes in St. Helens and occupied by happy home owners."

There is a house shortage in St. Helens at the present time and if the people can be prevailed upon to think of building their own homes this shortage will soon be a thing of the past, said one well known business man. The Mist does not expect any big building boom this year but indications are that more homes will be built this season than last year and bases its opinion on the manifest interest in the "Build Your Own Home Campaign."
