VERNONIA, Ore., March 22.—(Special to The Mist.)—The result of the school meeting of March 11, 1922, was that the community voted 58 to 10 in favor of the new high school to be erected on the old grammar school ground. In this way the board of directors were authorized to sell \$25,000 worth of bonds to build it. The building no doubt will be made of concrete and two and a half stories high. The plans for the building contain a full basement, large gymnasium and seven recitation rooms including the office, library, laboratory, domestic science and manual training rooms. C. E. Burgraf of Albany is the architect.

As soon as possible the bids will be let out and work will be begun. It will be finished and furnished by September 1 when school starts.

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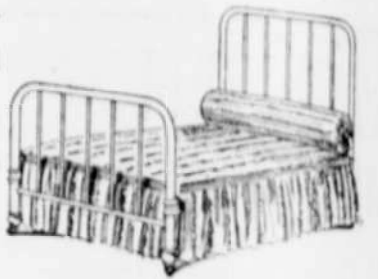
